

Ups And Downs of Food Prices at Beaver

After holding out as long as possible, Beaver Foods has increased prices on several items while a few were decreased. Affected were the entrées (lunch and dinner) and such things as cottage cheese, yogurt, juices and sandwiches. A list of selling prices from York Main was used as a reference, but Glendon's prices do not exceed those of the main campus and indeed are considerably lower in some cases. The policy concerning the meal package was also changed. Now, instead of having two "special" meals at a time, there will only be one

offered in this capacity and the other will be "a la carte". This is understandable if one considers the rising cost of food prices, especially in relation to pork, chicken and dairy products.

When Beaver signed its contract with York U, it was agreed that price reviews would occur three times in the year - one in September, one in January, and one at the end of the year. At the first one, although there was every indication that they would make little profit, Beaver at Glendon decided to stay within the old price list. However, this did not work and Beaver dinner hours have also been cut back and now dinner is from 5:00 to 6:30. This was done in an

attempt to serve hotter, fresher food to Glendon students.

Beaver recommended the price increases to the York administration, who then authorized them.

Students to Shout NO in Province Wide Protest

Most students except for a lucky few spend their university years in debt. The government calls it mortgaging their future. Most students would call it bad news getting worse. In many countries today tuition is free and the cost of education is reduced to provide universal accessibility. If a student decides to continue his education at a university, he will not be constrained by lack of funds.

In Canada, since World War II, universities have expanded and opened their doors to a great many students. Before this, only the privileged few attended, plus a few lucky poor who had enough brains to warrant the charity of the wealthy.

However education is still an expensive proposition and there's no guarantee that the government will continue to subsidize education forever. Though education is a provincial responsibility, the provinces get over half their funding for universities from the federal government under the Fiscal Transfer Act. Now most students realize the cost of living is going up and up and large scale inflation is causing recession. When a government has less to spend it can either tax more or cut back on spending. Infact, it may do both.

The government of Ontario has formed an Advisory Committee on Financial Assistance

to Students but it only has powers to advise which means very little real power. Ultimately its the Minister of Education and the Premier and his cabinet which make the decision. While the Advisory Committee has gone around Ontario having hearings and collecting briefs, the Treasurer of Ontario, Mr. McKeough, came out with a very lengthy document dealing with government spending and methods of dealing with problems encurred in these areas. The document was called the Henderson Report and in it, it was recommended that fees be increased 65%, from \$600 to \$970, the end of the grant portion of student loans, the firing of 2,700 professors, and an increase in student-staff ratios to 16:1.

We are not sure that the government of Ontario will implement this crazy scheme but it might, perhaps not this year or in two years but maybe when it feels the time is right. If it does, the University will once more revert to a place for the privileged few, most students will never even see a university, much less go to one. The Henderson Report is a time bomb and if it exploded it would injure the lives of many students. We have got to act now to protect our rights and the rights of all Canadians to attend university. The Ontario Federation of Students has organized a rally at Convocation Hall, University of Toronto on January 21 to

be attended by students from all the universities in Ontario, which will be followed by a march to Queen's Park and a demonstration where speakers from all three parties will attempt to answer the urgent questions of students regarding the future of education in this province. Many schools have asked that classes be cancelled on Jan. 21, to allow students to attend. We hope the administration

at York will prove receptive to this important request. At Glendon, there will be a general meeting of the students and hopefully, transportation will be provided for students to attend. The future of many students is in the balance, if the Henderson Report becomes a reality. Remember Jan. 21 is the day when students throughout Ontario will shout NO! We hope to see you there.

Council Rejects Henderson Report

The machinery of GCSU began to roll again after the holidays. The council meeting was a brief 45 minute affair; M.C.'ed by Don McKinnon who was filling in for Jean de Dieu. Highlighting the council meeting was Mike Drache's report on the OFS meeting at U of T ON Dec. 10th. It was resolved at OFS to reject the Henderson report. This report recommends large scale cut-backs in education. If the recommendations of the report are passed by the Ontario government, students would see their tuition increased by 65% (\$970), abolition of all student grants (replaced by loans), and large scale cut-backs to the universities themselves. The Glendon student council supported the OFS decision and is now plan-

ning to actively participate with OFS and many other Ontario universities in a collective protest against the government to be held Jan. 21.

The plans which have been proposed in council are a one-day moratorium, a rally at Glendon where the students will be bused down to U of T's Convocation Hall. These plans are only tentative and have yet to be finalized.

Derek Watt has resigned as Chief Returning Officer because of the 2 weeks of classes he missed last term while he was running the elections.

Student council was told by our business manager, Ron Stott, that the money has been received from York Main, resulting in a bank balance of \$5500.

Les Héros Québecois en France**L'Innocent d'Outre Mer**

S'il me faut aller au centre ville, je prends le bus car c'est vraiment trop loin d'y aller à pied. Hier soir, en pleine route, j'ai remarqué une affiche à côté de la rue... Connaissances du Québec - jeudi à 17,00 heures. Puisque c'était mercredi hier quand j'ai vu l'affiche, j'ai décidé d'y aller cette après-midi. Quand je suis arrivé au cinéma où la séance a eu lieu, il y avait une file d'une longueur extraordinaire. Je sentais une vague de fierté en voyant tous ces jeunes français qui voulaient se renseigner sur mon pays, qui voulaient savoir ce qui se passe dans la belle province.

Canada commence, décidément, à se faire sentir en France. Pour la première fois depuis le début de notre histoire comme nation, la République Française nous regarde avec un air de sympathie mêlé avec beaucoup de curiosité. Alors, pourquoi cette houle soudaine de questions à propos de notre pays. La réponse n'est pas facile, mais je crois que c'est principalement à cause de ce que j'appellerai les "héros québécois en France". Quand je dis "héros", tu penses peut-être à quelqu'un comme Robert Charlebois ou à un groupe comme Beau Dommage (la chanson La Complainte du Phoque en Alaska est toujours numéro un des palmarès ici), mais bien que les chanteurs québécois ont fait beaucoup pour "romantiser" l'image québécois en France, ce sont surtout les hommes politiques qui apportent le mot "canadien" aux lèvres de l'homme ordinaire en France.

M. Trudeau est probablement beaucoup plus populaire à Montpellier qu'il n'est à Toronto. Quand il a présenté au Parlement, le 14 octobre, une série de mesures limitant strictement les hausses de prix et de revenus, le journal Le Monde a porté une longue correspondance sur le sujet qu'il a intitulé **M. Trudeau propose le programme d'austérité le plus rigoureux depuis la guerre**. L'article était fort complémentaire, et dans un pays où il y a tant de chômeurs qu'en France, on a considéré les mesures de M. Trudeau extrêmement valables. On regarde notre premier ministre comme une sorte de playboy qui peut diriger très bien un pays (i.e. le notre) tout en charmant les femmes du monde entier avec son certain "cachet". Enfin, quand il s'est borné à indiquer qu'il resterait en vigueur "pendant une période de temps assez considérable" le 14

octobre, les français étaient plein d'égard, mais ils n'ont pas pu s'empêcher de se rappeler que M. Trudeau avait eu une affaire avec la fameuse Streisand avant son mariage avec la jeune et charmante Margret. Si Trudeau est plus célèbre, Gérard Pelletier est certainement plus actif en France ces jours. M. Pelletier, compagnon de longue date du premier ministre (il était ministre des communications jusqu'au printemps de cette année, et maintenant il se trouve ambassadeur désigné du Canada en France) est dans

les journaux presque tous les semaines. Il se concerne actuellement avec des ressources terminologiques, et la résistance aux anglicismes dans la langue des affaires et de l'administration. Il a récemment exposé, à l'occasion de la sixième Biennale de la langue française (à Luxembourg) une idée toute à fait géniale. C'était évident qu'il avait formulé depuis longtemps cette idée, qui était peut-être en herbe pendant ses idées comme (continued on page 3)

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


