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## Tabac et alcool : croire au jugement et au civisme des étudiants

Dès la semaine d'orientation, quand les étudiants ont coutume de célébrer, la loi anti-tabac a définitivement fait ses dents cette année. Maintenant, les autorités de York commencent à montrer les dents face à l'alcool.

Depuis le 6 septembre, la phase deux de la loi anti-tabac est entrée en vigueur et limité à moins d'une dizaine de locaux où la cigarette sera tolérée au Collège Glendon. Désormais, il sera interdit de fumer dans les théâtres, dans les entrepôts, dans les endroits de services et de commerce, dans les bibliothèques, dans les gymnases, les zones de réception etc et même dans les corridors, les escaliers et les toilettes. En fait, partout où l'affiche anti-tabac sévit ou prétend sévir. Parce que malgré son objectif très louable, celui d'améliorer la qualité de vie, l'application excessive de cette loi a pour clair objectif de faire abandonner l'habitude de la cigarette. Les différents palliers de gouvernements, fort partisans des politiques anti-tabac ont trop bien démontré qu'ils avaient le bras long pour en venir à leurs fins. Ils y sont allés d'interventions législatives dans la publicité sur le tabac et dépensent encore notamment pour des campagnes de publicité incitant les jeunes à joindre "une génération de non-fumeurs."

Toutefois, par exemple, avec la loi anti-tabac, si une plainte venait à parvenir au Centre des plaintes à la suite d'infraction au règlement, l'amende applicable de \$1000 serait-elle vraiment appliquée? Et si un étudiant était le contrevenant, où pourrait-il trouver cette rondelette somme?

La prochaine cible de York est la consommation d'alcool. Déjà, l'université a produit un vidéo sur le sujet, en raison de l'augmentation du nombre des moins de 19 ans à la suite des changements dans le système scolaire ontarien. Certains parlent d'interdiction de boire de l'alcool dans les salles communautaires, lieu de prédilection de rassemblement des "soirées après-pub," des soirées-vidéos, des soirées sociales étudiantes. Si ces rumeurs se confirmaient, il y a fort à parier que les salles de lavage seraient laissés aux étudiants qui voudront lever un verre... La modération a bien meilleur goût, dit le dicton et il faudrait un peu se fier au jugement et au civisme des étudiants. Qu'il y ait des écarts de conduite parfois, soit. Mais, il ne faut pas demander aux gens d'être des Saints. L'excès de règlements prend parfois des airs de répression.

Voici comment York a commencé traiter avec l'alcool et les moins de 19 ans, la semaine dernière. A l'occasion d'une spectacle du groupe "Stage 4" à la cafétéria, on a aménagé deux bars : un bar servant de l'alcool, l'autre pas. On a aussi "bien" pris soin d'identifier différemment les mains des étudiants de moins de 19 ans de celles des plus vieux. On pensait ainsi limiter la vente d'alcool aux plus vieux.

C'est là prendre les étudiants pour plus naïfs qu'ils ne le sont. Quand on veut, on peut arriver à ses fins et l'étudiant pour le moins futé se tournera du côté d'un ami(e) majeur(e) pour s'alimenter en alcool.

Bien que nous n'avions pas encore toutes les précisions sur la politique de renforcement de sécurité de York entourant la consommation d'alcool, il y a tout lieu de croire à ses limites.

C'est Pierre Elliot Trudeau qui a déjà dit que l'Etat n'avait pas à se mêler de ce qui se passait dans les chambres à coucher des citoyens. Entre les mesures prises pour éliminer la cigarette, réduire de façon importante la consommation d'alcool et l'intervention du gouvernement de York dans les chambres des résidents du campus, il pourrait n'y avoir qu'un pas.

D'ici là, quand vous serez sur le point de succomber à la tentation, suivez donc les conseils efficaces du Département de Santé et de sécurité de York, sifflez, griffonnez ou encore mieux, buvez de l'eau glacée avec un paille...

Which is a big load of crap, but necessary if we're to retain any self-respect at all.

Everywhere we pay lip-service to humanism but deny it with our lives; it's a hollow shell, a necessary delusion. Three billion people are starving tonight. Will you give up your new shoes? Can you? From right wing politicians on down to the most fervent Marxist, we're motivated by self-interest. The politician has a vision of power, of pleasure in an active existence. The Marxist also has a vision of power, of being an instrument that changes the face of the globe, of being a secular Messiah. The Cause is his over-riding passion, but take away his food for a week, while the rest of the group eats; he's likely to mug someone or steal from the petty cash.
