Ethnic awareness is very important because we must learn how to be accepting of others as equality can only be achieved through understanding. We are all different, but our differences are our greatest strengths.



York Undergrad charged in death of cab driver

York University student Alexander Ryazanov and Ryerson University student Wang-Piao Dumani-Ross released on \$50, 000 bail.

At 10:20 pm on Jan. 24 cab driver Tahir Khan dropped off his last fare and headed south on Mount Pleasant.

Racing north on the same road were two Mercedes driven by 18-year-olds, each pushing 140 km/h in a 60 km/h zone. The popular video game, *Need for Speed*, was found on the seat next to one of the drivers.

As the Mercedes rounded a bend, the taxi was making a left turn on to Whitehall Rd. A loud crash erupted, breaking the quiet of Tuesday night. One of the Mercedes, a silver 1999 model, T-boned the taxi, drilling it into a utility pole, police say.

Khan, 46, died instantly, and the driver

of the demolished Mercedes escaped with minor scratches. The driver of the second Mercedes fled, then returned to the scene to pose as a bystander after ditching his car a few blocks away, police report.

Khan was planning to return home on a visit to the district of Jhang, in Pakistan's Punjab region. Khan's mother was ill and he wanted to be with her. He also looked forward to visiting his brother, sister and wife of 15 years, whom he helped support since moving to Canada

almost six years ago. He was to receive his Canadian citizenship the day after his death.

Wang-Piao Dumani-Ross and his friend Alexander Ryazanov are each charged with

criminal negligence causing death. Ross also faces a charge of failing to stop after an accident causing death.

Ross made a brief appearance at College

Park court on Friday, where his lawyer, Morris Manning, told a justice of the peace that the bail hearing would be delayed until Feb. 7 for the new charge, which hadn't been formally laid by police.

A prosecutor for the case told the court earlier that the bid by the pair to be freed from custody before the case goes to court will be opposed by the crown on two grounds the likelihood they could re-offend, and the outrage felt by the community.

"It's a very sad situation which is impacting a lot of families and I think it will impact these families for a long time," Anthony Ross, the father of Wang-Piao, said in an interview on Jan.26. "He's just a kid," he added.

Ross's aunt and his father, Anthony, along with other family members and several friends were also in court, but later declined to talk to the media.

"It's a horrible irony," said Det. Paul Lobsinger about the presence of the video game. The *Need for Speed* is a game that allows players to choose high-end cars and race them through city streets while being pursued by police cruisers.

"Some have said this is life imitating art but I don't know," said Lobsinger, adding, "a game is a game, but when you get behind the wheel it's reality."

Lobsinger described the game as an "ultraviolent driving simulation, fighting simulation and criminal simulation."

"But are games the cause?" he asked. "Absolutely not. But, it is rather ironic."

Mild weather is here to stay: Environment Canada

Same warm water that led to record hurricane season is partly to blame by William Wolfe-Wylie CUP Atlantic Bureau Chief

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CUP) – Seven cities across Canada have recorded their warmest January in more than a century and temperatures aren't about to return to their normal lows any time soon.

According to Environment Canada, a combination of warm sea-surface temperatures in the Atlantic, low ice coverage in the Northumberland Strait and the Gulf of St. Lawrence, combined with low snow coverage, are the reasons for the mild temperatures currently being experienced in the Maritimes.

"Currently, the area around South-East New Brunswick is 5.5°C above average," said Claude Cote, a spokesman for Environment Canada. The average temperatures for a region are calculated by averaging the temperatures for the past thirty years.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., is currently the record holder for highest temperatures in Atlantic Canada with temperatures 6°C above average, a record for that city and "very significant" according to Cote.

According to Cote, the same warm sea water which led to a record number of hurricanes in the Atlantic this fall has contributed to the mild temperatures this winter. This has also led to reduced ice coverage in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Northumberland Straight.

"The Northumberland Straight should be frozen over and there is no ice at all in the Gulf of St. Lawrence," said Cote. Cote said that there should be a minimum of 50 per cent ice coverage in the Gulf at this time of year.

This open water has also had a moderating effect on the surrounding landmasses. As long as the open water is still cooling to the point of freezing, all of the energy contained in that water is being radiated into the air, adding to the mild climate around it.

"It takes a lot of energy to freeze water," said Cote.

The effect continues with low snow coverage throughout the Maritimes. The area around the Isthmus of Chignecto, that small strip of land which connects New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, the normal snow accumulation is around 23 cm. Currently, there is hardly more than 3 cm to be found. This, in turn, increases, the albido, or reflectivity, or the ground in the area. More solar radiation is absorbed by the ground instead of being reflected back into space. This solar radiation is then radiated back as more heat.

Currently, Environment Canada is forecasting milder than normal temperatures through the month of February and into March, by which time spring will have begun to unfurl.

The effects will be felt after that, though, said Cote. The warm winter will impact spring water levels since less water will have been stored in snow accumulation. Frost penetration into the soil will also be lower, he said, which could cause the ground to thaw earlier than normal.

Environment Canada is only able to make forecasts based on the next three months. Beyond that, the system relies entirely on statistical models which, in a statistically anomalous situation such as this, could be flawed.

American Takes Over Canadian Symbol

Toronto. On Jan. 26, Canada's oldest company, The Hudson's Bay, was bought up after its greatest shareholder, American Jerry Zucker, proposed an offer the Bay could not refuse. Zucker's Maple Leaf Heritage Investments Acquisition Corp. offered to pay more than \$1.06 billion, plus The Bay's debt.

Cop Guilty of Multiple Rapes

Montréal. On Jan. 26 a Montréal police officer, Benoit Guay, 34, was charged with multiple violent sexual assaults. His assaulting spree took place over the course of two years. His victims are seven women between the ages of 15 and 20.

Thousands of Seal Pups Drown Pictou Island. The violent blizzard in Canada's East Coast on Feb. 1 created powerful waves that yanked 75 per cent of the estimated 3000 grey seal pups in the Northumberland Strait into the sea. Not yet able to swim, the seals drowned.

Mayor Accused of Stealing Gas Lac La Biche. Mayor Tom Lett of the northern Alberta town is suspected of stealing 12,500 litres of fuel from a bulk station last spring. He has been charged with theft over \$5,000. A court date has been set for March 6.

Ford Puts Thousands Out of Work

St. Thomas. On Jan. 23 St. Thomas' Ford plant announced its plans to cut about 1,200 jobs. This change is part of Ford's massive restructuring plan, which includes 25,000 to 30,000 job cuts in North America by 2012.

Arrest Made in Severed Arm Case

Calgary. On Jan. 31 police charged 22-year-old Dean Aaron Commanda with second-degree murder and arson after an arm was found in a dumpster on Jan. 20. The severed arm belonged to 22-year-old Chad Largy, Commanda's childhood friend; the rest of Largy's remains have not yet been found.

Watery Gravesites Receive Their Due Peace

Toronto. The gravesites of three Great Lakes' shipwrecks, the Fitzgerald, the Hamilton and the Scourge, are now protected by a new provincial regulation that requires divers to obtain a special licence. For twelve years the families of the mariners pushed to have this protection; they were uncomfortable with the vulnerability of their loved ones' resting spots.

U.S., South Korea to Launch Free Trade Talks

South Korea. The start of talks that could lead to the most important trade agreement for the U.S. since NAFTA were announced last Thursday January 26th in a ceremony at the U.S. Capitol. South Korea, the U.S.'s seventh largest trading partner, exports computer chips, cellular phones and other consumer goods to the U.S. and prices could be considerably lowered by the agreement. However, South Korea's agricultural barriers are one of the highest in the world and are a cause for concern, especially for U.S.'s agricultural sector.

The World Honours Coretta Scott King

Mexico. Coretta Scott King, the wife of Martin Luther King Jr. one of the most influential advocates of racial equality in the U.S. during the civil rights movement, died early morning on January 30th in a private health centre in northern Mexico at the age of 78. Scott King stood shoulder to shoulder with her husband in the struggle for equal rights in the United States. Americans and admirers across the world immediately sent tributes of praise and remembrance of Scott King's exceptional fight for racial harmony.

New Orleans Hit by Tornadoes New Orleans. Already ravaged by hurricane Katrina just five months ago, New Orleans faced heavy tornadoes last week collapsing houses and battering Louis Armstrong International airport, authorities said. No serious damage was caused but further complications in the devastated region persist.

Outrage Over Cartoon of Islamic Prophet

Gaza. Outrage arose across the Arab world after caricatures of the prophet Mohammed were printed in European media. French press has been particularly targeted, along with Germany, Norway, and Denmark. Militants in Gaza threatened to kidnap members of the press from those countries while riots erupted around press offices in Europe. Spokesmen for the militants claim that the area will continue to be dangerous for European nationals until their governments apologize for the publication of the cartoons.

Mother not going to jail for mercy-killing case

A mother who assisted her son in his suicide was fortunate to avoid jail time, being sentenced instead to three years' probation.

The judge took over an hour to read his verdict in court on Jan. 27. The Crown left the sentence up to the judge.

The guilty is Marielle Houle, 60, of Montréal. On the night of Sept. 25, 2004, Houle helped her 36-year-old son, Charles Fariala, kill himself with drugs and asphyxiation.

Fariala had been diagnosed with multiple sclerosis in 2002, and by 2004 had begun to experience difficulty walking. He told the people in his life that he wished to die, and began secluding himself from everyone except his mother.

"(He) was more afraid of the future than of his actual condition," said Houle.

Fariala started to plan his suicide, researching various methods on the Internet. He even included details to be attended to after his death, such as the repayment of cigarettes to a friend and instructions on paying his bills.

He was meticulous and determined, and on the day he planned for his death, he called his mother at 5pm and pleaded for her understanding and assistance. She relented, and at 11pm that night they were together at his apartment when he ingested a cocktail of pills with some alcohol. He then lay in his bed, took more drugs, and Houle tied his hands together.

A few moments later after he seemed to be asleep, Houle covered her son's head with a plastic bag. She says she looked into his eyes until he died.

Fariala planned his death in a way that would not incriminate his mother. He left her specific instructions on what to do after he died, including waiting an hour to call the police.

In a state of grief, Houle forgot and immediately called the police. She was charged a few days afterward.

The most famous Canadian assistedsuicide case involved another parent and child. In 1997 Rober Latimer was convicted of murdering his daughter Tracy, who suffered from a severe form of cerebral palsy.

Houle's lawyer, Salvatore Mascia, described the crime as an act of unconditional love.

"It was a gesture of compassion, a gesture of love. She mustered the courage to be with her son and she believes she did the right thing at his request," appealed Mascia.

Hamas emerges victorious in shocking Palestinian election results

The Middle East is reeling from the unexpected rise to power of Hamas last week.

The political wing of the militant Islamic group Hamas stunned the international community recently by winning a majority of seats in the Palestinian legislature.


The results of the elections, released on Jan. 26th, announced the first change of government in the Palestinian Authority's short history. Previous to the Jan. 25th elections, Yasser Arafat's Fatah party had held power since the creation of the P.A. in 1994.

Although the successful exercise of democracy demonstrated by the Palestinian people is encouraging, the new leadership could increase turmoil in the region. Its leadership has said that it would only consider a long-term hudna (truce) with Israel under certain conditions including its withdrawal to the 1967 borders, the construction of a link between the Gaza Strip and the West Bank, and the release of detainees. The Israeli government has stated that it will not meet to negotiate with a Hamas-led government until it recognizes Israel's right to exist. Interim Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert has threatened serious repercussions to Hamas in the event of an attack on Israel.

Secretary-General Kofi Annan stated that the international community is unified in its condemnation of Hamas' use of violence and failure to recognize Israel. The United States and Europe both list Hamas

as a terrorist organisation; expressing deep concern about developments in the region, and threaten-

ing to cut off aid unless Hamas disarms, recognizes Israel, and respects the peace agreements already in place. U.S. Secretary of State Condaleeza Rice reiterated the American government's belief that a peaceful resolution could only be achieved through a twostate solution.

The United States has long been the largest financial supporter of the Palestinian Authority, providing over \$1.5 billion in aid since 1993. It is projected to contribute \$234 million in 2006. Current Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas implored the international community not to cut off aid suggesting it would cripple an already shaky economy and have a devastating impact on the Palestinian people.

While Hamas has requested that foreign countries continue to offer aid, they have stated that they will not succumb to international pressure, in regards to disarmament. Instead, Hamas has pledged to seek alternative sources of funding; which suggests that accusations of Iranian financial support may prove to be true.

Une abracadabrante accusation d'espionnage à Moscou

La pierre électronique peut envoyer des informations secrètes.

Des espions anglais communiquant avec des ONG russes grâce à une pierre cachée dans un parc de Moscou : on se croirait presque au début d'un long roman d'espionnage. Il s'agit pourtant des accusations prononcées par le FSB (ex KGB) à l'encontre de quatre diplomates britanniques, dont Marc Doe, deuxième secrétaire de l'ambassade.

Les services spéciaux russes ont dénoncé, le 23 janvier dernier, une collaboration criminelle entre les agents bri-

tanniques et quelques ONG, en particulier le groupe Helsinki pour la défense des droits de l'homme. Les « espions » auraient utilisé la pierre électronique pour envoyer des informations secrètes et financer illégalement des organisations non gouvernementales. Les prétendues preuves divulguées par le FSB se limitent, actuellement, à une vidéo des diplomates se promenant dans le parc. Londres a manifesté sa surprise et son inquiétude face à ces déclarations tout en niant

les faits reprochés. Les quatre hommes

Au-delà des révélations du FSB, dont là véracité semble bien discutable, cette affaire intervient dans un contexte d'oppression des ONG en Russie. Putin a ainsi signé, le 10 janvier, une loi visant à réglementer l'activité des ONG. Il est désormais possible d'interdire toute organisation non gouvernementale si ses travaux menacent «la souveraineté de la Russie, l'indépendance, l'intégrité territoriale, l'unité et l'originalité nationales, l'héritage culturel ou les intérêts nationaux». Ces termes vagues laissent une grande liberté d'action au Ministère de la Justice, ce qui provoque une grande inquiétude quant à l'avenir des ONG. Ces organisations constituent en effet l'un des derniers pouvoirs de contestation dans ce pays. Tatiana Kassatkina, directrice de Memorial, une ONG luttant pour le respect des droits humains s'insurge «C'est vraiment le retour au passé. Que les ONG russes reçoivent des financements étrangers, c'était connu et cela se fait de façon ouverte. Mais là, on cherche à accréditer l'idée que les ONG travaillent contre la Russie».

Google just might save the world

As of January 2006, internet surfers in China will be able to "Google". In a controversial deal with the Chinese government, Google has allowed its China-based servers for "Google. cn" to be censored. All information available must be filtered out through China's so-called "Great Firewall" and conform to a series of strict guidelines limiting access to China's estimated 100 million surfers. Information on the 1989 Tiananmen Square massacre, independence for Taiwan, Tibet, and human rights and democracy in general will be topics that are heavily censored. CNN, the BBC and most other western news sources will not be accessible. Yahoo and Microsoft are already operating in China and following these guidelines.

Ang Lee's Brokeback Mountain received eight Oscar nominations, including those for Best Director, Best Picture, Best Actor Heath Ledger, Best Supporting Actor Jake Gyllenhaal and Best Supporting Actress Michelle Williams.

Moreover, the 78th Academy Awards might also be a memorable night for George Clooney. The popular Hollywood actor was nominated for three Oscars - one for his supporting acting role in Syriana and another for his co-screenwriting and direction of Edward R. Murrow's Good Night, and Good Luck.

Crash's win at the Screen Actor Guild Awards for Outstanding Performance by a Cast in a Motion Picture has sparked rumors about the Oscar's top category. According to the rumors, Brokeback Mountain and Crash are front runners for the Academy's Best Picture Award.

Although, Memoirs of a Geisha received five nominations, the film did not obtain nods in the top categories. Similar to Memoirs of a Geisha, Pride and Prejudice obtained nominations for their achievements in the arts included best: Art Direction, Costume Design and Music (Score).

Yet, the Oscar Nominations were a disappointment to some possible contenders. Walk the Line did not get a Best Picture nomination although both Reese Witherspoon and Joaquin Phoenix received Oscar nods for their performances. Moreover, People Magazine contends that Russell Crowe, for Cinderella Man; Laura Linney and Jeff Daniels, for The Squid and the Whale, and Viggo Mortensen in A History



of Violence were left standing in the cold.

Defying U.S expansionism

Starring Steven Harper as Sam Steele.

Sam Steele is a Canadian icon. Anyone who has seen the Canadian heritage moment highlighting him, or who is a Canadian history buff knows this. Steele is the Mounty, who once defeated a boisterous American attempting to penetrate Canada's northern frontier during the Klondike gold rush. Essentially, Steele's heroism and political influence in Ottawa came to be as a result of his stand against the U.S from entering sovereign northern-Canadian-territory.

It takes a brave figure to stop Canada's goliath brother from infringing on its sovereignty, and most Canadians would revere any public figure with the resolve to do so.

Enter Prime Minister Steven Harper. Just days after Harper's minority government won the election, he is already talking about keeping the Americans out of the north. What great timing!

Le 23 janvier 2006 a été une nuit surprenante. Plusieurs personnes ont perdu leurs paris comme d'autres les ont gagnés. Une chose qui a probablement surpris tout le monde est les gains conservateurs dans la capitale provinciale du Québec. Les deux raisons principales sont les scandales libéraux qui ont écarté le parti de la course dans cette province, mais également le Bloc québécois qui n'a pas su s'imposer en tant que seule alternative, comme il a su le faire en 2004, en remportant 54 sièges à la Chambre des Communes. Pourquoi la concentration conservatrice n'est-elle présente qu'à Québec et incomparable au reste du Québec? Il faut noter par contre, que les conservateurs ont terminé devant les libéraux dans de nombreuses circonscriptions, sans toutefois représenter une réelle menace pour le Bloc. Cette question laisse plusieurs souverainistes bien perplexes.

En premier lieu, la ville de Québec est un phénomène unique à la province; sa population est plus aisée et plus à droite qu'ailleurs (sans toutefois être comparable à la droite de l'Ouest des Canucks). Depuis longtemps, les gens du grand Québec n'ont pas tendance à appuyer les mouvements populaires de la province; nous n'avons qu'à penser aux deux référendums sur la souveraineté, où l'appui au camp du OUI a été plutôt timide contrairement à de nombreuses autres régions francophones du Québec. Il est même possible de retourner jusqu'aux Rébellions de 1837-1838, où les dirigeants de Québec ont refusé de se battre auprès des Patriotes de la région de Montréal. Ce phénomène est en rapport avec le fait que, dès la colonisation, le pouvoir politique et religieux s'est établi à Québec - les gouverneurs, les évêques - et que le pouvoir est généralement pour le statu quo.

La couverture médiatique de Stephan Harper par les médias de Québec juste avant le 23 janvier est aussi pour quelque chose. Du jour au lendemain, une sympathie incroyable était accordée au chef et aux troupes conservatrices, se voyant comme solution aux querelles fédérales-provinciales et à la corruption libérale. L'actuel Premier ministre Stephen Harper a misé juste en promettant de régler le déséquilibre fiscal, ce qui a eu pour effet d'enlever une munition importante au Bloc québécois. De plus, la présence de candidats vedettes dans la région, Josée Verner et Maxime Bernier, ministrables, a accentué la vague et l'a étendu aux circonscriptions voisines. La position de pouvoir étant très alléchante pour la population, ce que le Bloc n'offre pas.

Globalement, le vote conservateur de la région de Québec ne peut aucunement être comparé à un vote conservateur ontarien et encore moins albertain. Le vote d'ici a été stratégique, par l'attrait des postes de pouvoir et par la promesse de règlement du déséquilibre fiscal. Il ne faut pas oublier que pour les défenseurs de l'autonomie provinciale, un parti de droite à Ottawa est très bien vu, ces derniers n'empiétant plus sur les compétences provinciales comme l'ont fait avec arrogance les libéraux par le passé. Reste maintenant à savoir comment les troupes de M. Harper sauront remplir les attentes dans la région de Québec, car leur appui demeure fragile. Vont-ils pouvoir faire valoir leurs intérêts et leurs politiques « sociales » conservatrices (contre le mariage gay par exemple) toujours très impopulaires...

FoG Saves the Day!

Have you received an award from the Friends of Glendon (FoG) but don't know who the Friends are?

FoG was formed in 1971 by Glendon faculty, students and administrators to assist students at risk of dropping-out because they couldn't meet their basic living expenses. Today, FoG raises funds through donations from Glendon faculty, staff, alumni and parents, the Living and Learning in Retirement (LLIR) group that meets every Friday on campus, and special events.

FoG's Strategic Plan calls for it to raise an additional \$100,000 by 2008. By a unique arrangement with the college and the GCSU, 100% of donations are channelled into student awards.

FoG's financial assistance comes in the form of bursaries, scholarships and emergency loans. Bursaries are awarded on the basis of financial need. When you apply online for the York Undergraduate Bursary you are also applying for Friends of Glendon Bursaries.

FoG scholarships recognize academic achievement. There are scholarships for outstanding incoming students as well as scholarships for continuing and graduating students who are at the top of their class.

FoG emergency loans carry students through temporary financial crises. These loans (up to \$750) typically hold students over until their student loans are available. You can apply for a FoG emergency loan at Student Financial Services.

Every Glendon student is a voting member of the Friends of Glendon, a federally chartered, non-profit corporation managed by a board of directors composed of Glendon students, faculty, alumni and staff. Each autumn, at FoG's annual meeting, a minimum of four students are elected to the Board of Directors. You can give back to FoG and the Glendon community by becoming a student representative on the Board, by helping when FoG calls for volunteers for the annual Glendon phone-athon or by participating in other special projects throughout the year.



Getting to know... Professor Benessaieh



Professor Afef Benessaieh was educated in Montreal, Quebec and received her Bachelor's and Master's degrees in political science at UQAM, specializing in International Relations during her Bachelor's degree and Political Economy during her Master's degree. Due to her involvement with a research team, Professor Benessaieh was able to finish her Master's degree in a year and a half. Following this, she was involved in research at the National Autonomous University in Mexico City for a year. During this time she developed an interest for Political Sociology. Professor Benessaieh received her PhD at the University of South California at the school of International Relations, with an emphasis on Political Sociology. Her major interests are sociological and anthropological approaches to International Studies. Recently, Pro Tem was able to sit down with this fascinating woman to discuss her views on Canada on the international stage.

PRO TEM: One subject that is on a lot of student's minds this month is the recent Canadian elections. This is the first Conservative government in over a decade and Stephen Harper is often criticized as being a mini President Bush. Do you think this view is justified?

Professor Benessaieh: I must admit that since I've been spending time in Mexico, I am a little more stimulated by what is happening there. The political process is such an intense, hard, and very debated space where people are really engaging and talk about fundamental questions, including visions of the society and visions of how to do politics. Here, I am a little bit more bored by what is happening. I tend to follow Canadian politics a little more distantly. I am not particularly proud of it.

As for Stephen Harper, I don't know the guy. Most of his statements during the campaign were aimed at demotivating and discrediting his opponent. I have no sense of Harper being particularly close to any U.S-based interest. As Prime Minister for the time being, I think it would be extremely imprudent of him if he moved too close to the U.S. I'm not too sure he's that type of person. A lot of the accusations that were flung during the debates were aimed at discrediting each other's images, so I'm not sure we should buy into that, perhaps completely misplaced, unfounded rumour. I would be surprised if there was a radical move made towards the U.S. In Canada anyways, there is something called the Public Opinion. Our public opinion is quite sensitive about being too close to the U.S. I would suppose a good Prime Minister would at least be sensitive to, let's say, prudently dealing with public opinion.

PRO TEM: You've almost completely answered the next question, which was, do you think relations between the US and Canads will become stronger under Harper?

Professor Benessaieh: It was one of the points raised during the pre-election campaign. One of the critiques that was raised against Martin was this idea that U.S and Canadian relations had been deteriorating under Martin. So, I suppose if the guy wants to be coherent with what he was raising during the debate, he would, at least in appearance try to rectify some

of the tensions that exist between the two countries.

PRO TEM: I recently read that many Latin American nations are turning their back on Washington. For example, Bolivia, Uruguay, Argentina, Venezuela under Hugo Chavez, as well as potentially Mexico depending upon the July election, if Lopez Obrador wins - all because of what was labeled a "potential leftist oil block". It stated that now is the time to set up an independent Canadian foreign policy in that region. What are your thoughts on this?

Professor Benessaieh: Well, we've always had a very independent policy in Canada towards Latin America. Canada was one of the very unique nations to maintain a very good relationship with Cuba. Canada has always had a very neutral stance; a very friendly stance towards Venezuela,for instance and never backed the U.S in terms of their political ideals in Latin America. With the rest of the continent, Canadian foreign policy standards are quite different from the US. In fact, at least in principle, we are generally much more open to the idea of a leftist government as long as they are supported by democratic elections.

PRO TEM: This same article also mentioned that if Ottawa got too close to Chavez or Morales, it risks a US backlash if relations between the US and Venezuela blow up. Do you think this is the case, or do you think this is a risk we should take?

Professor Benessaieh: I don't know. It seems to me if an ambassador or a Canadian diplomat received a comment vis-à-vis the US, that kind of issue is troubling. The answer would be that we're a sovereign country and are perfectly entitled to how and with whom we choose to establish our foreign relations and I don't think the U.S can have anything to say on this. To keep a sense of good bilateral relations with the U.S administration and diplomats we may have to take into account some suggestions. However, we also have other means by which to conduct diplomacy. That is, CIDA and guas-independent NGOs such as Rights and Democracy, which are and can be used as complements to our diplomacy agenda.

Less High School Students Want to Come to York

This year York University has seen a 1.8 percent decrease from last year in high school applicants, while other universities across Ontario have seen increases up to 9 percent.

Preliminary figures released on Wednesday, January 18th by the Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) show that Ontario has seen 1.6 percent rise in applicants and other universities such as the University of Toronto have seen a 1 to 2 percent increase.

Despite these numbers York has maintained its number two position in Ontario, next only to the University of Toronto in terms of first-choice applications. Statistics released by OUAC also show that York has been able to maintain the second highest number of high



school applications overall.

The Vice-President Students, Robert Tiffin, is choosing to concentrate only on the positive. "What these numbers show is that students are specifically choosing York over other institutions. Where we are seeing a dramatic drop-off is in the number of students placing York further down their list of choices and this is affecting our overall applications number slightly. But the absolute number of students putting York as their first or second choice indicates that York continues to be a primary destination, not a backup."

The statistics do not take into account applications from mature students, overseas students or transfer students.





Celebrating Black History Month

30 years of Reflection

"Black History is a central piece of Canadian identity."

This February marks the 30th anniversary of Black History Month. Dr. Carter G. Woodson, a black scholar born to former slaves, launched the original event, Negro History Week, in 1926.

At Harvard, Woodson discovered

in his textbooks that blacks were represented, in ways that reflected the inferior social position they were assigned. Woodson decided to write African-Americans into their nation's history.

In 1915, he established the Association for Study of Afro-American Life & History and founded the Journal of Negro History one year later. Woodson chose the second week of February to celebrate Negro History as it includes the birthdays of abolitionist Frederick Douglass and President Abraham Lincoln.

Douglass, a former slave, rode his way to freedom after boarding a train from Maryland, dressed in sailor's gear, carrying the identification papers of a freed black seaman. He became America's most famous black abolitionist and one of the most influential authors and lecturers in U.S. history.

Lincoln's major contribution to African-Americans was eliminating slavery with the Emancipation Proclamation. However, some abolitionists criticized Lincoln for only freeing slaves held under the Confederacy in 1863, while waiting until 1865 to release those held in the Union.

As part of the 1976 American bicentennial celebrations, Negro History Week was extended into National Black History Month. Official Canadian recognition came in the early 1950s, when the Canadian Negro Women's Associa-



tion successfully petitioned Toronto City Council to acknowledge the occasion.

slaves.

Every year the event has a different theme. This February's is "Fraternal, Social, and Civic Organizations." The year 2006 marks the 110th anniversary of the National Association of Colored Women, as well as the 100th anniversary of Alpha Phi Alpha's founding. APA was the first intercollegiate Greek letter fraternity built for African-Americans. The founders, known as the "Seven Jewels", attended New York's Cornell University. Their mission was to create a literary and social support group for minority students who felt victimized by racial prejudice.


Slavery existed in Canada for over hundred years as well. In the early 1700s, under French rule, thousands of Africans arrived in New France (now known as Quebec), mostly as slaves to French Aristocracy. Slavery continued under British rule until 1793, when Lieutenant Governor John Graves Simcoe passed the Act Against Slavery, allowing for gradual abolition. By 1810, Canadian slavery had ended.



Martin Luther King Jr.:

Born: January 15, 1929 Died: April 4, 1968

Martin Luther King, Jr. worked for civil rights and racial equality in the United States during the 1950s. He participated in the Montgomery, Alabama bus boycott and many other peaceful demonstrations. He won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 and was assassinated on April 4, 1968, in Memphis, Tennessee.



Harriet Tubman:

Born: 1820 Died: 10 March 1913

Tubman became one of the most successful "conductors" on the Underground Railroad in the mid-19th century. She is credited with leading more than 300 slaves to freedom. She became a speaker on the anti-slavery lecture circuit and a friend of the principal abolitionists.



Just a Month of History?

Morgan Freeman sparks a debate after questioning why black history is constrained to a single month.

"Confining Black History to a month is ridiculous"

The month of February bears much significance for many in the African-American community. The month-long commemoration of black history is used to remember those who risked their lives to stand up for the freedoms that America today prides itself in. However, unlike many in the African-American community, Academy Award winning actor Morgan Freeman wishes


to distance himself from celebrating African-American month, branding the idea of confining black history to a month "ridiculous". The 68 year old actor and film director, who worked his way up from children's TV shows to soap operas and subsequently to roles in feature films, voiced his displeasure during an interview with Mike Wallace of CBS' investigative show "60 minutes". "I don't want a Black History month" Freeman said, adding "There's no white history month." Freeman's comments noticeably caught Wallace off-guard; however, it is hard not to empathize with Freeman's stance on this issue. "You're going to relegate my history to a month?" enquired Freeman.

Freeman had single-handedly kindled a firestorm of debate about limiting the observance to 28 days. His comments caught the attention of many in the African-American community and beyond. As a result, the real purpose behind a Black History month came into question. "So you had this system that was categorizing people and putting them in certain spots. And I think Black History Month continues that whole tradition of doing that instead of dealing in reality with what happened to black people," remarked William Cole, a professor in the African-American Studies Program at Syracuse University.

Cole maintained that the idea of a Black History Month was thought-provoking; although he indicated that the month should not be separated from American History but rather be compounded into the multifaceted history of America.

"That relationship can't be told in a month because it is very complex. It is continuing to evolve," stated Cole, a view shared by Freeman. "Black History is American History," and as Freeman pointed out, it should be taught and embraced as such. To restrict black history to a 28 day observance both confines and trivializes the historic contributions of African-Americans across North America.

Born: May 19, 1925 Died: February 21, 1965

Malcolm X was a militant black leader in the United States. In 1963, he formed the Muslim Mosque, Inc. organization. After a pilgrimage to Mecca in 1964, he announced his new belief that there could be a brotherhood between blacks and whites. His view was that of militant Black Nationalism, but no longer of separation.



Rosa Parks:

Born: February 4, 1913 Died: October 24, 2005

Rosa Parks was a pivotal figure in the fight for civil rights. In 1955, when she refused to give up her seat in a bus for a white man, she was fined and arrested. Her example caused a national sensation that eventually led to widespread desegregation in the United States and the civil rights movement of the 1960's.

As I lay here dying, I wonder, what have I done with my life? I lived in a way I thought was moral and decent. People always told me I was one of the nicest people in the world. But what does that mean as I lay here dying?

My fiancé. What will she think? How will she go on without me? I'm not being conceited but we were one great looking couple. When I proposed to her she jumped into my arms and I knew she would be mine forever. When I am gone will she move on to someone else? She's not going to be mine forever anymore.

And my brothers? My family? What will they think? They rely on me. I am their rock. I keep things together. My poor little brothers, who watch me as I lay here dying. My poor little brothers, who saw the bullets go through my skin. My poor little brothers will never recover. I don't want to die -

I'm slipping further but I can still feel. I know that someone is trying to save my life. I can feel them working on me. I'm staring death in the face and now I am scared. I'm not scared for myself; I am scared for everyone else. I don't want them to miss me. I don't want them to think that I wanted to go. I want them to know that I fought with everything I had, but the bullet won.

It's not fair that my life has to end this way. I know I am in the ambulance. I can't hear anything anymore. I can't feel anything anymore. I'm still trying though. I am trying to hold on. I am trying to live but it hurts so much. This is it. I am taking my last breaths. I will miss my life. I will miss living. They took away my life, and I wasn't finished living it. I don't want to go, but I know it's my time. My last breath does not hurt.

My body looks so calm amidst the blood. I look around at the paramedics and the ambulance. I say my final goodbye to my body. I stop off at my fiance's place and whisper that I love her in her ear. She shivers and holds herself. She doesn't know I'm dead yet. I hope she never finds out.



So what makes Smith an up-andcomer? Perhaps it is the fact that at 22years-old he has already had five solo art shows in the span of two years, all within the York University community




Serving in the USA

A Journalist's attempt to navigate minimum-wage world a strong, empathetic piece of work



Ehrenreich, who has written articles for numerous magazines such as Ms., The Atlantic Monthly, and columns for Time and The New Progressive has a history of social commentary. She abandoned a career in biology (for which she earned a PhD) to pursue political activism, and is now vicepresident of the Democratic Socialists of America.

Despite such a track record, fiftysomething Ehrenreich is open with readers about her initial reluctance to accept Harper's Editor Lewis Lapham's proposal for the assignment. It is her background in science that ultimately swayed her towards accepting the offer: "In that line of business, you can think all you want, but sooner or later you have to plunge into the everyday chaos of nature." It's a

good thing she does, for *Nickle and Dimed* represents a noble contribution to the realm of investigative journalism.

Like a good journalist would, Ehrenreich walks in to her assignment with a flimsy theory she is open to see beaten down: that she can find a job and an apartment that can meet her \$1000-a month-budget, including room and board.

Ehrenreich divides the book by her stints: she first works as a waitress (Serving in Florida), a maid (Scrubbing in Maine) and a retail worker at the dreaded Wal-Mart (Selling in Minnesota). She recounts each experience front-to-back, describing everything from seeking out budget hotels, Owl Books, 240 pages Reviewed by Kristjanna Grimmelt Creative Writing Editor

to day-long brainwashing sessions for \$7.50-an-hour jobs, to adding dollops of whipped cream to pies after lunch rush.

Despite an affable resilience that sparkles throughout the text, Ehrenreich admits she becomes progressively flustered by setbacks. In one particularly desperate scene, she describes herself lying exhausted in a dilapidated hotel bedroom eating a bucket of KFC, a shopping bag spread out across her lap, TV blaring. "It somehow seemed less lonely," she explained, than eating out.

Ill moments aside, Ehrenreich is persistent and optimistic, and she kept me hooked. Her voice is honest and easily accessible to the general population, and she is not afraid to foist her own self and opinions into the narrative.

Because of Wal-Mart's mandatory urine testing, for example, Ehrenreich cheats, as she's worried about some lingering THC in her system. She attempts to rally her disgruntled peers into unionizing, making no bones about her disgust for the way corporate America treats its employees.

With such exploration into the personal, Ehrenreich's dissection of the political is all the more jarring. The contrasts she presents us – between the proliferating 'McCondos' glutting up Minneapolis and the absence of absolutely anywhere for a minimum wage worker to get a decent bed – illustrate the nature of a problem that cannot remain ignored. I strongly recommend *Nickel and Dimed* as a critical, straightforward look at corporate expansion, faltering welfare programs, and the widening gap between social classes in North America.

Barbar Ehrenreich has recently published a second book, Bait and Switch: The (Futile) Pursuit of the American Dream, in which she explores the realm of the white-collar unemployed.

LAL Creates a New World

An interview with Rosina Kazi, leading vocalist of LAL

L t was a rainy morning as Rosina Kazi and I discussed Toronto's local music scene while eating some delicious humus and taro fries at The Rivoli. Kazi is of Bangladeshi heritage, but was born and raised in Brampton, Ontario. Her vocal style blends hip-hop, soul, and classical Indian sounds making for a unique and refreshing listening experience.

Kazi grew up in a family that was very much into music and art. As a young child, she always wrote songs but only started pursuing a professional music career in her late 20s. Her 'asian underground'/electronic band, known as LAL has performed in Toronto venues such as the beautiful Massey Hall and other non-traditional spaces such as Harbourfront, the Drake, and Lula lounge. LAL has also toured across Canada and the UK.

This talented, young woman is also very politically involved and works as the assistant events coordinator for the Toronto Women's Bookstore, a feminist bookstore that caters to the queer community. Kazi is also the events coordinator for several events in Toronto such as the summer's largest South Asian festival, Masti, Mehdi, Masala! This festival started off as a celebration of India's Independence but now incorporates all of the arts. Kazi has also worked in conjunction with the Toronto Social forum, an anti-globalization group associated with the World Social Forum.

Kazi has also received many grants for her work in the community and is always helping new and upcoming musicians. The best way of doing this is by holding cross-cultural events that showcase new talent. She works hard at educating people about arts funding, "There's very little government funding in the States but there's a lot of private funding while in Europe, it's incredible, they have both."

LAL struggled to get where they are today simply because the Canadian music industry lacks the infrastructure to support the type of music they make. LAL's music doesn't fit into any particular category but audiences and independent media across the country have been receptive and supportive. LAL was recently welcomed to perform in Montreal at MIA, Montreal Intercultural Arts. A theatre and gallery for dance, music and visual art whose mandate is based around mixing art forms. "They understood us right away [whereas] it took the Toronto Art Councils a considerable amount of time to wrap their heads around our electronic music fused with world and soul rhythms."

Meeting with Rosina Kazi was an eyeopening experience. It made me realize the importance of involving more young people of migrant communities into the decision making process of public art organizations.

LAL will be developing their next album over the next three months while touring Europe. Kazi may also travel to Bangladesh to check out the ever-growing electronic music scene, but for now she continues to perform across Toronto.



Learning to manage anger is a necessary component of healthy living. Anger is an emotional state that embodies the idea of aggression which is usually caused by what is perceived by humans as a threat, either physically or through verbal conflict.

In terms of "physical threat", anger initiates the fight-or-flight response, where humans have mere moments to decide whether to fight who is threatening them, or to flee to avoid confrontation. In terms of "verbal conflict", the ability to speak to our enemy reduces the effect of physical strength. Fighting might include refusal to back down when arguing, while fleeing can entail submissive language such as, "You're right."

Physiologically speaking, when a human is threatened, several things occur in the body. When the brain recognizes a threatening situation, it sends electric impulses to the hypothalamus: the part of the brain that is responsible for

metabolism and unconscious actions such as breathing. This stimulation makes the adrenal medulla release the hormone adrenaline. Adrenaline attaches to receptors in the body and increases heart rate, dilates pupils, and increases hydrolysis of glycogen into glucose: a sugar the body can use for energy should the need to run ever arise.

Anger management is no simple task however, there are a few steps that we can follow. First we must identify and make note of all instances that cause us to become angry. We must then make a conscious effort to recognize those instances when they occur, step back from the situation and perhaps take a minute away or distract ourselves. In order to bypass fits of anger we must think before we act.

Detaching oneself from anger can be extremely challenging however with a strong will the pursuit of a happier life is not far off.



NBA ALL-STAR GAME

For the second time in the event's history, Houston has been selected as the host city for the NBA All-Star Competition. The 55th annual All-Star Game will be played at the Toyota Center, home of the Houston Rockets, on February 19th, 2006. Houston first hosted the midseason classic in 1989 before a record crowd of 44,735 at the Astrodome. In that game, the West posted a 143-134 victory behind MVP Karl Malone's 28 points and John Stockton's 17 assists, which included an All-Star record nine assists in a single quarter. Chicago's Michael Jordan scored 28 points for the East, while the Los Angeles Lakers Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Magic Johnson's injury replacement on the West roster, played a record 18th and final All-Star Game.

The NBA All-Star Competition has evolved into a weeklong celebration that enables fans worldwide to experience the thrill of the world's greatest athletes playing the game they love, while also leaving a lasting impact in each host city's community. The NBA All-Star festivities tip off on Friday February 17th, as the league's top rookies and second-year players square off in the Rookie Challenge. The excitement continues the next day with NBA All-Star Saturday featuring Shooting Stars, a shooting competition featuring NBA players, WNBA players and NBA legends; the Skills Challenge, a competition of top guards working against the clock to complete a series of passes, long-range

shots and agility drills; and the Three-Point Shootout, where six of the NBA's best longrange shooters compete in a test of threepoint shooting accuracy. The evening's grand finale is the Slam Dunk Contest, which showcases some of the NBA's best athletes, as they take to the air, mystifying fans with their gravity-defying moves.

The week concludes with the NBA All-Star Game on Sunday before a worldwide television audience that reaches more than 200 countries. Leading up to All-Star Weekend will be the 13th NBA All-Star Jam Session, the ultimate interactive basketball experience. The event is open to the public and will provide fans of all ages the opportunity to take part in NBA All-Star 2006.



When Race Was War

On June 22nd, 1938, Joseph Louis Barrow, known in the history books as Joe Louis, stepped into the ring against Max Schmeling. German-born Max Schmeling was lethal and broke down his opponents in a methodical fashion. Joe Louis on the other hand, was a young black up-and-comer, rocketing his way through the heavyweight ranks en route to a showdown with Schmeling. In their first meeting on June 19th, 1936, Schmeling cleverly out-boxed the younger Joe en route to a twelfth round knockout. Outside the ring, the two led considerably

different lifestyles. Max Schmeling was a kind and gentle man, who happened to be German and lived under Nazi rule. While certainly no Nazi himself, Schmeling became a symbol for Nazi Germany. His conquest of the young black American Joe Louis only served to push this notion forward.

Joe Louis was born and raised in an underpriviledged black community in the early 20th century. He was a quiet, soft-spoken young man with a southern drawl who complacently took his seat at the back of the bus. The American people took him as a symbol of American patriotism, not as a Negro; perhaps truly the first of his kind.

So it was on that faithful day in June that two men, the living embodiment of a supreme race and the pride of a nation for once blind to race, stepped into the ring.

This time it would be Joe's day, as he hammered Max into submission inside the first round. Reflecting on that day, Schmeling recalled to a Jewish journal- "I'm almost happy I lost that fight. Just imagine if I would have come back to Germany with a victory. I had nothing to do with the Nazis, but they would have given me a medal. After the war I might have been considered a war criminal".

Despite the enormous pressures behind the two in those horrible times, they would become good friends. As a testament to their long-lasting friendship, Schmeling paid for Louis' funeral, who died impoverished because of the color of his skin.


