Several sexual assaults were reported near York University by residents of the neighbouring townhouse strip known as The Village. A suspected assailant was recently arrested, but has yet to be convicted.

The suspect, a 28-year old male, was arrested on December 20th for assaulting

a woman between Sentinel Road and Pond Road.

A male bystander witnessed the suspect struggling with a woman who managed to escape. As the suspect started his car, the bystander called 911 on his cell phone and used his own car to block the suspect in. The suspect subsequently circled and tried to flee, but was trailed by the witness, who was able to maintain contact with the police. Police captured the suspect about half an hour later. Charges have been laid and the suspect appeared in court on December 21st.

The victim has not been in contact with the police following the assault and has yet to report it, though police have been urging her to come forward. Police are still advising students and staff to be careful, stressing that the suspect might not have been the perpetrator of the November attacks.

On December 1st, York University warned students to be cautious and suggested using the Campus 'Go Safe' shuttle service. Earlier this year students criticized Go Safe for dropping passengers off at designated stops just outside The Village, forcing many residents to walk deeper into the complex to reach their front doors.

Subsequently, Go Safe has changed its policy and is now dropping passengers at

their request between designated stops, provided it does not deviate from the route. Also, Go Safe now begins running at 5pm, since it's getting dark earlier.

Despite these improvements, some students feel the main problem is that York's security doesn't extend to Sentinel Road. In regards to expanding York's security service, fourth year Anthropology major Tamara Bagg said "They definitely should. It's ridiculous that women are being assaulted so close to campus and there's nothing security can do to prevent it."

York Speech Combats Religious Censorship

Publisher of controversial Danish cartoon defends free speech.

he Danish cartoons that sparked global debate in 2005 have returned to York University. *Free Inquiry* editor, Tom Flynn, gave a presentation hosted by the Secular Humanist Club at York entitled "Blasphemy,

Censorship, and the Media" on December 11th at Keele Campus. *Free Inquiry*, is a "secular humanist" publication that circulates to about 30,000 readers in the

United States, and is also one of the few news organizations around the world that decided to print the controversial cartoons as a stand for free speech.

Flynn showed four of the 12 cartoons that he had published in the *Inquiry*'s April-May edition during the presentation. He warned the audience prior to showing the cartoons that they may be offensive, as it

is forbidden in the Muslim faith to portray important figures as visual icons, but noted that it is unclear whether any of the images actually depict the prophet Muhammad. The violation of this religious law by the

"Media declined to let readers creators of the cartoon was the major source of the controversy.

Flynn advocated that people should not necessarily be lining up to see the images,

but that the right to see them shouldn't be taken away from them. "Media declined to let readers see for themselves what the ruckus was all about," he said during an interview with *Excalibur*, which he believes is fundamentally against free speech. Stephanie Rudolph, a first year Glendon student, agreed with Flynn saying "they decided to give it [freedom of speech] to us

and they can't take it away. You can't make exceptions for certain images."

Borna Radnik, president of the Secular Humanists Association at York, believes that discussing the controversy is key to understanding the issue. Discussion allows important questions to be raised by these images, which can be addressed in positive open dialogue. According to Radnik, "Anything that attracts emotion, especially negative emotion, needs to be talked about. If the issue is there, it's not going to go away."

Bombs Over Somalia

US and Ethiopian troops aid Somalian government against terrorist organization.

n Islamist group, the Union of Islamist Courts (UIC), is being attacked by a combination of forces from Ethiopia, the United States, and the Somali government after taking control of a majority of Somalia during the last six months. Ethiopia's Parliament passed a measure allowing their troops to take all necessary measures to prevent any invasion by the UIC on November 30th, according to the BBC. The Ethiopian troops have since managed to capture the southern port of Kismayo and

the city of Mogadishu from the UIC after bombing a major airport. These cities have been reclaimed by the Somali government.

The UIC is considered a threat to peacekeeping forces in the region, as they support al-Qaeda and have been suspected of sheltering three al-Qaeda suspects wanted by the US: Fazul Abdullah Mohammed, Abu Talha al-Sudani and Saleh Ali Saleh Nabhan. The three suspects are wanted on counts of bombing and attempting to bomb US embassies and allies in Kenya.


The dropped bombs from a massive AC-130 gun ship southern into Somalia in an attempt to kill the three suspects, as well as to support Somalia's transnational government. None of the suspects were killed, but according to rep-

resentatives of the US stationed in Somalia, several allies of the terrorist network were. According to the BBC, Abdullahi Yusuf, Somalia's interim president, claimed that "The

Bush a réagi en déclarant: «Un procès juste était impensable sous la férule tyrannique de Saddam Hussein. La

résolution du peuple irakien de tourner la page est rendue manière dont Saddam a été évidente par le fait qu'en dépit des crimes horribles qu'il a commis contre

Un enregistrement amateur laissant entendre des commentaires tels que «Va en enfer», permet de qualifier Hussein de martyr dans

> l'esprit de plusieurs. Le président égyptien Hosni Moubarak a déclaré: «Personne ne va oublier la manière dont Saddam a été

exécuté. On l'a rendu martyr et les problèmes de l'Irak demeurent.»

Plusieurs Irakiens étaient inquiets du fait que l'exécution ne fasse qu'empirer la violence dans le pays et les autorités américaines ont déclaré qu'il était malhabile d'exécuter la sentence le premier

jour de l'Eid, une fête musulmane célébrant la fin du Ramadan, la paix et l'amour.

Le premier ministre de l'Irak, Nouri Maliki, demeure pourtant optimiste puisqu'il espère que la disparition du dictateur déchu renforce le pouvoir du gouvernement sur le pays.

Le nouveau secrétaire général de l'ONU, Ban Ki Moon, a déclaré pour sa part que l'Irak avait le droit d'imposer la peine de mort et a demandé aux insatisfaits de ne pas oublier la nature des crimes de Saddam Hussein.

Deux co-condamnés qui devaient être exécutés aux côtés de Hussein ont vu leur exécution reportée pour s'assurer que la journée commémore exclusivement l'anniversaire de la mort de l'ancien dictateur. Leur exécution est prévue dans les prochains January 16, 2007

In the past, the space known as Cafe du Manoir and the Pipe Room-located in the basement of the manor- has traditionally been used as a space for students. **It now sits vacant.** Glendon students and faculty are making a firm request that this space be <u>re-opened to the community.</u> Yoani Kuiper, last years' Student Council President, and Pier Bernard-Tremblay –the current president- along with Alladin Daikun of Greenpeace, have drafted a proposal outlining the prospective arrangement.

Community Membership and Community Management

The cooperative would work in such a way that membership could be bought for a minimal yearly fee. Board members would be elected by those with a membership. Finances would also be dictated by members, making the process democratic and allowing those involved to play a part in the decision-making process. Those who use the Cooperative will also run it and this will create new job opportunities at Glendon. Because it follows this multi stakeholder approach, the intellectual resources from professors, the human resources from students and the political resources from administration will all be used and considered collaboratively.

Further Benefits of Introducing this Program

The cooperative would allow Glendon to have more power in recruiting new students, as well as allow the campus to keep up with the 'Green Movement'. This is also in harmony with the administration, which has already developed a Green Plan to be implemented into academic plans at the school. Glendon Professors such as Prof. Gomez, Abergel and Schoenfeld, along with M.A Antoine- Royer are also supportive members of this proposal and other faculty members are encouraged to get involved, as the cooperative actively seeks to be inclusive to everyone in the Glendon Community.

Currently, a reply is being awaited, following the presentation given to the Glendon administration on December 11th, 2006. The ideas are there, the faculty and undergraduate support is there and the initial capital is there. Pending approval, the potential 'Cultural Revolution' that has been fallow in this tight-knit community could be reborn.

Oprah, Eat Your Heart Out



Au fond, la "nation"

Le projet national québécois n'est pas une motion de la chambre des communes fédérale. C'est un fait.

Pour décider ensemble, il faut délibérer ensemble. Cette phrase semble simple, mais contient une vérité profonde. Pour articuler un débat, un groupe doit bénéficier d'une base historique ou culturelle commune sur laquelle construire critiques et réformes. Les actes du groupe doivent aussi avoir un sens et un impact sur cette même base. Le philosophe Charles Taylor la qualifierait d'horizon de signification. Ce dernier renferme tous les éléments que nous qualifions aujourd'hui de sentiment national. En ce sens, toute démocratie viable est constituée d'une nation politique qui doit être reconnue et définie explicitement pour qu'elle puisse au moins être soumise à la contestation générale.

Ce fait est reconnu depuis le début du républicanisme moderne qui voit simultanément apparaître les premières manifestations nationalistes. Le projet impérial de Napoléon est tout

d'abord mis en échec puis les siècles renforcent la tradition politique en voyant émerger le principe de l'État-nation et l'apparition de l'Europe contemporaine.

Reste qu'il est faux d'associer nation et souveraineté. Pour s'épanouir, une identité politique nationale n'a besoin que d'une entité de délibération politique, ce qui est théoriquement possible dans le cadre d'une union fédérale. Ce principe est reconnu dans plusieurs pays dont la Belgique où les nations Wallones et Flamands ont choisi d'évoluer ensemble au sein d'un État commun.

La reconnaissance de la nation québécoise pose un problème au Canada depuis l'adoption du principe de « multiculturalisme » qui avait le but noble de rénover l'identité canadienne et de l'encrer profondément dans les principes de tolérance et d'inclusion. Dans les faits, cette politique ne fait qu'accorder la suprématie de la nation politique canadienne anglaise sur toutes les autres existants d'avance au pays.

Le principe de nation est en effet loin d'être étranger au Canada. L'immigrant désirant participer à la vie politique du pays devra s'adapter à sa langue, son système politique et à une certaine histoire commune. Il est ainsi impossible d'avoir un débat sur une implication militaire canadienne en passant sous silence son passé plutôt pacifiste.

Il en va de même au Québec ou la langue, la culture politique et le bagage historique sont différents. La reconnaissance de ce fait ne devrait pas être perçue comme une menace par le reste du pays, mais comme le gage d'une vie démocratique et civile saine et active.

La seule manière d'en arriver un jour à l'établissement d'une nation commune reste la communication et la destruction de toutes les barrières érigées entre les deux solitudes.

Is it right to declare

Quebec's unique culture warrants its status as a nation.

Le terme «nation» basé sur le partage d'une langue, d'un territoire, d'une ethnicité, d'une histoire et d'un futur était utile au 19e siècle et au début du 20e, à l'âge de l'impérialisme. Il fut construit pour désigner des groupes de gens ayant pu dans le passé se gouverner en accord à leur code moral et leur croyance et ayant été déchirés par les puissances coloniales françaises, anglaises ou portugaises.

Dans ce contexte, se présenter en tant que « nation » allouait aux populations disposant d'une culture et d'une ethnicité commune un fondement solide sur lequel réclamer leurs territoires originels.

La prétention nationaliste des Québécois et des Québécoises, cependant, ne remplit aucune des conditions nécessaires à l'établissement d'une « nation », comme celui de réunir un groupe disloqué et de le rappeler aux yeux du monde. Le Québec désire plutôt la reconnaissance de sa culture et de sa langue. En vertu de cette définition, plusieurs autres provinces et communautés peuvent revendiquer le titre de nation et souligner leurs traits distinctifs, en raison entre autres de l'afflux d'immigrants survenu au cours du siècle dernier. La Colombie-Britannique dispose, par exemple, dispose d'une importante population asiatique qui partage les traits caractéristiques d'une « nation ». Ils se considèrent néanmoins très Canadiens, et ce, en dépit de toutes leurs différences. Le premier ministre du Manitoba déclare d'ailleurs à ce sujet : « Pour moi, le Canada est une nation et un pays. Je comprends que le Québec est unique en terme de langue, de culture et de lois, mais le Canada ne reste qu'un seul pays », selon CBS News.

Le nationalisme fut utile lorsque les nations luttaient pour la juste restitution de leur territoire. Le nationalisme québécois, par contre, n'a pas d'impact sur la vie quotidienne d'aucun citoyen canadien, qu'il soit anglophone ou francophone, sinon que de donner une place plus importante à la culture québécoise qu'à celle des autres ethnies constituant le Canada. Dans notre ère moderne, il ne serait pas éthique de permettre à un concept aussi dépassé que celui de « nationalisme » de perturber l'unicité multiculturelle du Canada et de placer un groupe

au dessus d'un autre au sein de la constitution.

Since their settlement in the 16th century, French speaking colonists have considered themselves Canadian. Another Man's Treasure

Don Forgay is shedding light on Toronto's trash. An avid recycler with a self-professed predilection for strange things, Forgay does his part by rescuing discarded items and refashioning them into lamps. With over 100 in his 'Streetlamps' collection, these one of a kind creations sell anywhere from 75 to 500 dollars each.

Armed with a toolkit containing pliers, box cutters, and screwdrivers, Forgay peruses the dark streets on his bicycle in search of unusual and useful items. These scavenger hunts have taken him as far as Hwy 427 and Eglinton but most nights Forgay stays within his neighbourhood of "Little Portugal." In the past, he has discovered such contraptions as vacuum cleaner hoses, a roof vent, and steel shelving among other odd items,"I have carried steel cabinets as large as a coffin" boasts Forgay.

Though it sounds like a dirty job, Forgay is quick to assert that he has never delved into a garbage bag or dumpster. Rather, he takes things that have

been placed by the curb which, in his belief, are left by people who are ashamed of tossing items that are still in workable condition, "They bundle them up to hide the shame or they attach labels asking that they be taken. My personal favorite is 'free to a good home'" says Forgay with a hearty laugh.

Recently, Forgay held a Streetlamps' exhibit in his home. Among his electric collection was a dressmaker's mannequin stuffed with christmas lights. Sitting nearby was a lamp constructed from a golfcart for it's base and a kid's plastic drinking cup for its shade. Notably disturbing, albeit visually stunning, was a chandelier constructed entirely of empty prescription pill bottles. From this exploding cluster, each blue plastic canister held a tiny light, casting a warm glow over the room.

Though there has been an increased demand for ownership of his lamps, Forgay maintains that 'Streetlamps' is not a commercial enterprise, quickly adding, "but I don't mind selling them." Concerning his

environmental contribution, Forgay adds, "I try not to have any illusions that my work makes a difference." However, Forgay has a heavy conscience about the environmental repercussions of his lamps. "The big political conundrum from making lamps from garbage is that they turn out to be the worst lamps in terms of energy consumption." For this reason, Forgay has recently decided that one non-garbage item is acceptable: dimmer switches. These switches consume less energy and add an aesthetic element. In the near future, Forgay will likely implement LED bulbs to replace the less efficient incandescent bulbs of

Despite his nonchalance, his lamp creations have managed to garner the attention of the *Globe and Mail* as well as the local community. As for the future of 'Streetlamps,' Forgay will continue to do what he has been doing all along, scouring the dark corners and driveways of Toronto on garbage night, flashlight in hand. One man's junk is another man's treasure.

Dual campus student Brent Delaney knows how to utilise his resources! While studying as an English major at Keele, Brent works and writes for the stage at Glendon. His theatrical beginnings at Glendon have led him to establish his own company, Rebel Arts Productions. Brent is also currently working on something for this year's Fridge Festival and/or Summerworks Festival.


Rebel Arts Productions Inc. is a company that produces both music and theatre productions. Among their projects so far, Rebel Arts has flown in Girl Talka mash-up DJ from Philadelphia- to perform in Toronto, as well as produced the very successful five-day run show *To Be*

Continued at the Fairview Library Theatre. A website for the company is currently under construction.

Brent and his two partners, Eve Picard and Alex Goldberg (also former Glendon students), believe that Rebel Arts is continuing to grow and prosper. Besides having the creative sense to write and produce performances for the stage and screen, Brent also has a good business sense and has evidently used it well to start his own company. Why start a company, you might ask? "You need a company in order to produce shows", Brent says. In doing so, you have creative control, and more power over deciding the "who, what, where, why and how" of a production.

With such an undertaking comes some sort of hardship or barrier. For Brent, it has been finding the right people for the job who have the appropriate set of skills and discipline. "There are also common barriers of funding budgets to produce a show that have to be overcome on a daily basis," expalins Delaney.

His advice to those who want to start a similar venture, or simply specialize in the entertainment industry, is to be persistent, confident and driven in a world of rejection and constant criticism. The nagging question in your mind "Is it good enough?" will always arise, but if you don't try, you'll never know



I'm not sure if hip-hop really is dead, but it's definitely a little under the weather. Nas is without a doubt one of the strongest rappers out there and when an album this respectable comes along, hip-hop gets a bit healthier.

Zuning In On The iPod

Microsoft challenges media player champion Apple iPod

The Microsoft Zune, named by the internet community as the "iPod Killer", is poised to challenge Apple's latest development in a chain of successes: the 30GB iPod video. As far as price, both are approximately two hundred and fifty dollars, but the differences between the two products are obvious when placed side by side. Both contain 30 GB of storage, but the iPod is dramatically thinner and therefore looks like a toy from the future. Both screens are 320x240 pixels; however, the thicker Zune has a much larger screen, which can turn horizontally and create a widescreen.

The Zune uses Windows Media Player, the Microsoft standard media player, and plays WMA, MP3 and AAC files; whereas iTunes immediately converts files to AAC to sync onto the iPod. Purchases are made from Zune Marketplace, and once you make a purchase, the file is yours to burn, share, and transfer, unlike with iTunes, where each file is protected. The prices for songs are around one dollar for both stores, but iTunes has more media for sale, such as audio books and TV series.

The Zune's most original feature is the Zune-to-Zune wireless "community," in which one Zune user can scan the contents of another Zune within 30 feet to borrow songs for three plays within three days, or share photos indefinitely. This feature also opens

up the possibility for XM radio in the future, on top of the already established FM tuner in the Zune. Though iPod does not have an FM tuner, it has its own free Podcasts which include playlists of artists of certain genres and programs from major broadcasting networks like NPR, ESPN and Comedy Central.

In design, the iPod is still far more advanced than the Zune, which only comes in three colors –black, brown and white –and which lacks basic features such as a clock. If development continues however, and Microsoft perfects its product in the way that Apple has, the Zune could present a real competitor for the iPod in years to come.

Jesus Camp est le film le plus intéressant, le plus alarmant et le plus stimulant des dernières années. Le documentaire de Rachel Grady et Heidi Ewing, présenté à Toronto le 10 janvier dernier dans le cadre d'une tournée mondiale sera disponible en DVD à la fin du mois. Il suit Becky Fisher et le déroulement de son camp d'été, Kids on Fire, qui est fréquenté par des enfants évangélistes chrétiens. Il est presque impossible d'aborder ce film sans parti pris. Chacun a son opinion sur la religion. Le seul vilain présenté dans le film est Tom Haggard, l'ancien dirigeant de la National Association of Evangelical, non seulement parce qu'il se présente comme un hypocrite à la lumière de récents scandales, mais aussi par la manière dont il dénigre l'enthousiasme de Levi.

Même si le film n'a pas pour but de juger ses sujets, il reste choquant. Les scènes où Betty confie qu'elle voudrait voir de jeunes gens sacrifier leur vie au nom de la Parole de Dieu ou celles où une multitude d'enfants tendent leurs bras vers une image grandeur nature de George Bush ne peuvent pas nous laisser indifférents. Les réalisateurs présentent l'hôte d'une émission de radio chrétienne, non pas pour questionner les croyances Évangéliste, mais pour mettre à jour leurs ambitions politiques qui incluent la criminalisation de l'avortement, nier le réchauffement climatique et faire de l'Évangélisme la seule religion officielle des États-Unis d'Amérique.


