CORRUPTION IN THE GCSU

The Glendon College Student Union has finally presented its budget for the 1992-93 school year. The budget, produced by GCSU Vice-President Patrik Marier, was $presented\ at\ the\ Council\ Meeting\ on\ Tuesday, November$ 10, and a motion has been submitted to vote on its acceptance at the next meeting on November 17.

The budget is characterised by tremendous cutbacks in many areas, particularly for each Director's Committee. These cutbacks will make it difficult for Directors to fulfill their mandate of addressing student problems and planning events. As Mr. Marier was unavailable for comment, Sharmila Khare, the union's President, expressed her support for the Vice-President's tight-fisted budget. Ms. Khare believes that the present GCSU was left in a poor financial state because of the actions of last year's GCSU under President Mark Adlam and Vice-President Bassam Abou-Naim.


On September 20, 1972, thirteen members of the Glendon Community created a corporation without share capital under the name of "Pipe Room Board of Glendon College" for the following objects:

"At 2275 Bayview Avenue in the said Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto, and not elsewhere, to establish, maintain and conduct a club for the accommodation, recreation and convenience of the members of the Corporation and others... It is hereby ordained and declared that the Corporation shall be carried on without the purpose of gain for its members and any profits or other accretions to the Corporation shall be used in promoting its objects..."


The results of this endeavour ended in York's sole student-owned and operated non-profit business. Each and every member of the Glendon Community is a shareholder in the Corporation and, as such, should be involved in actively promoting and supporting the Pub.

Since its incorporation, the Pub has been self-financing, that is, it has been able to generate enough income to purchase equipment, carry out renovations, finance special events and continue its

hours of operation without is calling on its members for financial support. However, in the past 18 months, a number of events, beyond the P u b control of the Pub, have depleted the surpluses built up over the years to the point that the Pub is no longer able to self-finance its capital projects (ie, purchase of new equipment). This is not to say the Pub is in a deficit, nor does it owe more money than it has in reserve. But the Pub is not in the financial position to carry out its mandate of







When the new Council not pay the bill. assumed its role at the end of with boxes of supplies that had been purchased last year. Ms. Khare regards these as useless purchases and an obvious waste of student funds. The new council was also left with the responsibility of paying numerous outstanding bills.

One particular bill, of approximately \$5 000, was for the Work Study Programme. The Work Study Programme is funded by the Ontario Student Assistance Plan and creates jobs for students. At Glendon, the employees of the GCSU, (for example the secretaries and translator), receive 75% of their salaries form Work Study and the other 25% from the union. During the year, York University provides the students' pay cheques and then is refunded by the government and the GCSU. However, last year's executive, for reasons unknown to Ms. Khare, did

The most disturbing as-May last year, they were left pect of last year's GCSU finances was a category entitled "Special Projects", for which a little over \$11 000 was spent. Although Ms. Khare was a GCSU Executive member last year, she had no knowledge of these projects. In fact, the auditor of last year's budget called these projects "suspicious" and thought they deemed legal investigation. After consulting last year's files, the records indicated that \$1 000 of Special Projects money was spent on an electrical survey of the Salon Garigue by a company called Tradco, which was provided with equipment that it never returned. Ms. Khare has no knowledge or recollection of this survey. Furthermore, Mr. Adlam and Mr. Abou-Naim obtained the services of Krazno Enterprises, a research and communications consutling organisation, to compile a "Strategic Planning



and Consultative Advisory Report" for the GCSU. The cost of the report was \$1 500 for "Promotional and Set-up consulting for 'Orientation Week' packages" and \$1000 for "Framework Consulting". Again, Ms. Khare had no knowledge of this project. Furthermore, Ms. Khare finds it suspicious that the Presi- ready met with the new David Goldstein, is a graduate of Glendon, personal friend of Mr. Adlam and his former campaign manager. Furthermore, this report was undertaken to improve the quality of service of the union, which perhaps could have been completed by the Glendon community, free of charge.







GUATEMALAN STREET CHILDREN

16 year old José Efraín Vasquez Solís was walking down the street in Guatemala City when a car pulled up on the other side of the road and two men got out. They had guns and fired some shots into the air, which frightened Josék, so he began to run away. The men yelled at him to stop; when he did not, they caught up with him, handcuffed him and forced him into a car. They accused José of stealing and beat him until he passed out.

When José gained consciousness, he found that he was in another part of the city. His abductors were still with him and once again they began to beat and torture him. As a result, José managed to reach the refuge of Covenant House (Casa Alianza), an organisation which helps street children. José was admitted to hospital for his injuries, but had to leave that night because his safety was threatened by private police officers who had come around asking for him.

José's story is only one of many cases of abuses against street children in Guatemala. According to agen cies who work with street children in Guatemala, there are approximately 5000 street children living on the streets of Guatemala City. Amnesty

International has received many reports of human rights abuses: beatings, tortures, disappearances, and extrajudicial executives against street GUATEchildren carried out MALA by the police and private security forces in Guatemala. According to the police, street children are responsible for the high level of crime in Guatemala City. Many of these street children have no choice but to steal to survive. The abuse of street children is not a new phenomenon, but cases have been more publicised lately, because of these or ganisations, such as Covenant House, who demand inquiries into these cases and that the perpetrators be brought to trial.

Brazilian street children in Rio de Janiero face similar treatment. According to the Secretary of the Civil Police of Rio de Janeiro, 427 homicides against minors took place in Rio de Janiero in 1990. Between January and June of 1991, 139 more children were killed.

In March of 1991, as a result of accusations by Amnesty International of the killing of street children in Brazil, the State Assembly of Rio de Janeiro set up a Parliamentary Commission of Inquiry to investigate the execution of street children.

According to a report put out by the Parliamentary Committee, most of these killings were carried out by death squads. Death squads are usually made up of off-duty police officers who are hired by shopkeepers to get rid of thieves and criminals. The Commission also found evidence of the involvement of police and judiciary authorities with these death squads.

There have been charges against and trials of those responsible for the kiling and abuse of streetchildren, but very often they are given light sentences, or their sentences are not enforced.

Very often, witnesses who testify against those responsible find their life in

danger. Testimonies that have been given by children have led to new abuses against them. Street educators who work with street children and ask for inquiries into murders and abuses are often targeted and very often abused by police forces.

Amnesty International is concerned that the failure of the authorities to bring to justice those responsible for the killing and abuse of street children makes it appear that the legal and police forces condone such offences. Amnesty International is urging the Guatemalan and Brazilian governments to ensure that the charges against those responsible for 6the execution of street children be brought to approptiate justice.

One of the projects that the Glendon Amnesty Inernational group will be working on this year is the cases of violations against street children in Brazil and Guatemala. Our activities in this campaign include: the following: public awareness of these cases, writing letters to the accused governments to ask for an end to this violece, and a full investigation into these violations which will ensure that those responsible will be brought to justice.

Surrogacy is the term commonly used for this arrangement: a woman is artificially inseminated with the sperm of a man to whom she hands over the child after the birth. The woman receives payment, and the couple legally adopts the child.

This new method of con-Since only women can ception holds out hope for infertile couples, but also raises a number of alarming and unresolved ethical, moral, and legal issues. The prospect of a woman becom-

ing a 'surrogate mother', conceiving a child for an infertile couple, surprises some and shocks others.

The number of troubling moral and ethical issues it raises includes the possible exploitation of poor women, who may be branded "baby machines", the rights of natural mothers versus natural fathers in a custody battle, and the essential question of whether a child should be bought and sold at all. Furthermore, the ever persistent strict religious belief that having a child is not a right, but rather a gift from God, insinuates guilt.

quially known, is one of the thirteen reported ways to make a baby outside the bedroom. Others involve various combinations of eggs and sperm, different types of artificial insemination, and in-vitro fertilization.

With infertility on the rise, decreasing availability of newborns, abortion, and changing social patterns, more couples are turning to other options to have a family. Surrogacy offers the growing number of childless couples the thrilling satisfaction, joy and beauty parenthood gives. 

PLAYING BY THE RULES

In every organisation there is one man entrusted to run it smoothly. Nowhere at Glendon is that more apparent than at the GCSU, with its speaker, Frederick Russell, a fourth year political science/history student, has been the initiator of the GCSU's new system of procedure and order at its weekly executive meetings. In reality, Russell claims, "This system is not new. It is outlined in the constitution, but it hasn't been followed in past years." Russell's re-education couldn't have come at a better time, with the reworking of the constitution and election acts and the election of several new faces who will direct GCSU activities. Representatives elected last year have been targeted by Russell as the beneficiaries of the reorganisation process. By learning these procedures, Russell believes that, "they can effectively take charge of the process and lead while I act as as servant. That's how its meant to be in reality." Reaction to the new methods of running executive meetings has been met with mixed feelings amongst its members. Newly elected reps stand by their speaker in support of the new procedure. Yet hesitation is felt by the number of small veteran politicians who feel that the procedures that Russell proposes would be constrictive. Some, like Cultural Affairs Director Karen Fieten, believe that, "it's great but it should be watered down." In other news, while the reorganisation is going on at the GCSU, questions arise not only about what is going on behind close doors at its executive meetings, but also the status of its power-structure. Last week, vice-president Patrik Marier passed on his power to the GCSU president Sharmila Khare. This has raised major questions of conflict. Who will take over in his stead? Is it legal for one person, namely the president, to have such "defacto" unchecked power?

FEELING BLUE

Depression is a disturbance in mood characterized by varying degrees of sadness, disappointment, loneliness, hopelessness, self-doubt, and guilt. Most people tend to feel depressed at one time or another, but some people may experience these feelings more frequently or with deeper, more lasting, effects. In some cases, depression can last for months or even years.

The most common type of depression is what is referred to as "feeling blue" or "being in a bad mood." These feelings are usually brief in duration and have minimal or slight effects on normal, everyday activities.

In the next level of depression, symptoms become more intense and last for a longer period of time. Daily activities may become more difficult...but the individual is still able to cope with them. It is at this level, however, that feelings of hopelessness can become so intense that suicide may seem the only solution.

A person experiencing severe depression may experience extreme fluctuations in moods or even a desire for complete withdrawal from daily routine and/or the outside world.

Symptoms of Depression

Depression may affect one's life in any of the following ways:

1) Changes in Feelings and/or Perceptions

- Crying spells or, at the other extreme, lack of emotional responsiveness
 - Inability to find pleasure in anything
 - Feelings of hopelessness and/or worthlessness
 - Exaggerated sense of guilt or self-blame
 - Loss of sexual desire
 - Loss of warm feelings toward family or friends

2) Changes in Behavior and Attitudes

- Lack of interest in prior activities and withdrawal from others
 - Neglect of responsibilities and appearance
- Irritability, complaints about matters previously taken in stride
 - Dissatisfaction about life in general
- Impaired memory, inability to concentrate, indecisiveness, and confusion
 - Reduced ability to cope on a daily basis

3) Physical Complaints

- Chronic fatigue and lack of energy
- Complete loss of appetite, or at the other extreme, compulsive eating
 - Insomnia, early morning wakefulness, or excessive sleeping
 - Unexplained headaches, backaches, and similar complaints
- Digestive problems including stomach pain, nausea, indigestion, and/or change in bowel habits

Helping Yourself

Being honest with yourself about changes in mood or the intensity of negative feelings as they occur will help you identify possible sources of depression or stress. You should examine your feelings and try to determine what is troubling you - relationships with family or friends, financial responsibilities, and so forth. Discussing problems with the people involved or with an understanding friend can sometimes bring about a resolution before a critical stage of stress is reached. Even mild depression should be dealt with if it interferes with your effectiveness.


