SAVE BAYVIEW 11 ROUTE!




A proposal is now before the Toronto Transit Commission to change the Bayview 11 bus route. If accepted, the route would be truncated: the bus would turn on Sheppard Avenue instead of continuing to Steeles Avenue. This decision would affect many members of our community, since many of them use this route to come to the campus every day.

A petition organised by Business Manager Leon Wasser will be presented to the TTC. It requests that the Commission give one more year to the present route in order to build up a sufficient ridership that would prove its usefulness.

Mr. Wasser invites all the members of Glendon community to sign the petition that will be submitted at a crucial meeting with TTC on Tuesday 24 November.

He hopes that with the support of Sunnybrook, the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, and other institutions located on Bayview, the TTC will reconsider its decision and allow at least one more year before operating any changes.

Montréal Massacre Remembered

Nearly three years ago, on December 6th, 1989 at "L'école Polytechnique" in Québec, 14 young engineering students were killed by a gunman who had burst into their classroom shouting anti-feminist insults. All of the victims were women.

In response to this tragedy, women's groups have mobilised to make December 6th of every year a remembrance of the Montréal Massacre. By setting this day aside as a time for all Canadians to mourn and remember, they hope also to raise awareness of the violence which occurs daily against women in homes and on the street.

Here at Glendon, the Women's Centre will be holding memorial services, in the Hearth Room throughout the day on

December 3rd and 4th. This will give Glendonites a chance to pay their respects to the victims.

Next door in the Salon Garigue two videos made in reaction to the massacre (1 in English, 1 in French) will be shown.

Information, including literature regarding violence against women, will also be available. Everybody is welcome to come in and browse.

Classes have been cancelled from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. on December 4th.



The Deadly Seas of Capitalism and Corruption

As news breaks, we must pause for a moment and consider it. Recent GCSU news crashed ashore with the deadly "sea" of corruption.

Now consider the Pub. The Cafe de la Terrasse, or the Pub as it's known to most, has reported what must appear as an inexcusable error. Once reported to have a debt of \$18,000, *Pro Tem* ran a front page story last week telling us that the Pub was not in fact in debt. The tidy \$18,000 sum has been taken care of. Upon careful review of the Pub's books, an ingenuous soul might have said

"Hey guys, look at these surpluses from previous years over here! Why don't we just cash in our 6% savings bonds and pay off our 12% loan?"

One cannot help but appreciate the timing of the release of this news. Generous as Glendon students are, it's questionable just how generous they would have been on the last referendum had they known that the "\$18,000 debt" was a mistake, a simple over-

sight.

Proceeds from last Thursday's pub, the beach attire pub, went to Covenant House. Although the organisers (C-House, Wood residence) donated their time and effort to help the charitable cause, the Pub kept 50% of the door admission. Showing half-hearted support for the cause, I attended.

Jo-Ann Vidi, Pub manager, said that after paying off the \$75 sound equipment rental charge, the Pub should be left with "around \$150" from Thursday's "door". Some expressed disapproval at the Pub's capitalistic instincts as Thursday's pub was intended for charity. But with a misappropriation of

\$18,000, clearly there are bigger fish to fry.

The Pub is an integral part of life at Glendon and we'll all agree that Glendon (bilingual experience extraordinaire) should continue. Therefore, the Pub should continue, but some will question how it should do so. Misleading the student population then passing referenda which impose payment by all students (regardless of if they even know where the Pub is) is one method. But is it the right one?

Another way to raise the necessary funds (though I question the necessity) might be to raise prices. This would have the equitable effect of

making those who use the Pub pay for it. Although I do favour the current "competitive" pricing of beer, any economics student will tell you that due to the nature of demand for most Pub confectionary, raising prices will raise total revenue.

Finally, we must ensure that our property is well-managed and because all Glendonites are shareholders in the Pub Corporation, I encourage all to join me in attendance at the Annual General Meeting. The meeting will be held on Thursday, November 26 from 4:30-5:30 in the Pub. Buy your competitively priced drinks early as the bar will be closed during this hour.

As far as I understand from reading the article, he/she believes that police are against the proposed legislation because it will create more paper work for the.. THAT'S THE MYTH. Truly, their anger over the proposed legislation has nothing to do with more paper work. In fact, cops already spend a great deal of time reporting and doing paper work. One more report on occasion would not make a big difference. The police

are afraid that the government will use the reports in question against them in a court of law. Although the N.D.P claims that the reports will only be used for statistical purposes, they are not willing to draw up legislation that would prevent them from being used against police officers.

I believe this proposed legislation is not only extremely unnecessary but it is also dangerous for the police and the citizens of Toronto.

Firstly, the police are already sufficiently accountable to the general public,

through such committees as the Complaints Bureau, Internal Affairs, Special Investigations Unit, which is publicly run and the Provincial Public Complaints Commission, just to name a few.

Secondly, if this legislation passes, it will undoubtedly cause hesitation in some instances on the part of the police officer. In the line of action hesitation can kill, whether or not it's the police officer or an innocent bystander. Their job is already tough enough, let's not make it tougher.

Lastly, If this legislation goes through, perhaps we should also have the police write reports whenever they draw their billy clubs, their flash lights, or their pens.

The Naked 21/2 "The True Story"

Dear Mr. Editor,

The following is an article that I wrote after reading a truly unfair and even worse, inaccurate column. The column was published in your paper in the forum section on Monday November 16, 1992. The article was entitled "The Naked Gun".

I am writing this article in hopes of informing you of the truths surrounding the confrontation that I am sure you are all aware of involving the police forces of Ontario and the NDP government's planned "use of force" regulations. Namely the "unholster of a sidearm report.

On October 4th of this year, the Metro Toronto Police Association urged its members, of which I am one, to not wear their police hats and to use greater discretion in issuing Highway Traffic Act summonses. (Not as many of you were led to believe, stop issuing tickets all together). Now many of you might be saying, "Well, this question has been asked a lot by the media, but I have still to see any answer printed in any of our three major papers. Yet I know that they have access to it if they wish. The answer can be found in the Highway Traffic Act as well as section 495 of the Criminal Code of Canada, "... A police officer may arrest....". So you see that police officers have been given discretionary powers which they have the sworn right to

THE GAMES PEOPLE PLAY

When the Ontario Lottery Corporation brings a new product to market, it has no reason to gamble. Having a government enforced monopoly of enterprise once controlled by organized crime, the Corporation is very profitable and certainly stable.

When the Corporation introduced its latest form of ignorance tax, it added a twist.

Usually, the Corporation would have each participant simply hand over his or her money and then declare one or more of the participants winners (but certainly handing them only a fraction of all the moneys collected).

Now, with its newest lottery (called "Sport Select"), participants wager their winnings on the outcomes of sports games. Participants are to choose a minimum of three to a maximum of six games, and are to choose teams from a list of professional sports,

including both American and Canadian football and hockey.

Several students on campus have expressed enthusiasm over this new lottery and *Pro Tem* spoke to two such students.

Pro Tem also spoke to professor Mac Donald, an economics professor who gives a course on game theory.

Professor Mac Donald

spoke briefly. Mac Donald said that in negative sum games (such as lotteries, casinos and horse races), the total payout to the winners is less than the amount paid by the participants. Clearly, a participant reduces her odds just by becoming a participant.

Although he said that lotteries were basically a "tax on the stupid," he added that a sports lottery might conceivably be "not pure chance."

Les Derniers Humains. Enfin !

Celui que les inconditionnels de Richard Desjardins attendaient sans doute avec beaucoup d'impatience est maintenant sur le marché depuis plus d'un mois au Québec. Il s'agit du nouvel enregistrement de son premier album produit en 1988 grâce aux 400 admirateurs qui avaient accepté de payer 10 \$ de mise de fond pour financer un projet dans lequel aucune grande maison de production n'avait osé se risquer.

Son succès, Desjardins l'a connu avec son deuxième album, *Tu m'aimes-tu*, qui lui a permis de remporter, en 1991, le prestigieux Félix du meilleur auteur-compositeur québécois, et de se faire connaître à travers le Québec et jusqu'en Europe. À 43 ans, le « chanteur à lunettes » perçait enfin dans le monde du showbusiness sans l'aide des géants de l'industrie.

Ceux qui ont été séduits

par les mots tantôt tendres et amoureux, tantôt durs et révoltés du second album retrouveront un style semblable dans *Les Derniers Humains*, dont les textes sont cependant plus hermétiques que ceux qui sont plus connus comme *Tu m'aimes-tu*, *Le bon gars*, *Et j'ai couché dans mon char....*

Avec *Les Derniers Humains*, Desjardins nous fait voyager à travers

l'univers : du Japon où en 1948 « la poussière retombe », jusqu'à « cent mille sous zéro et depuis cent mille ans » dans la toundra, en passant par Miami avec ses « pauvres touristes offrant aux cieux leurs vies perdues, leurs tas de suif », et le sud des Etats-Unis en dénonçant de façon très directe les colonisateurs-envahisseurs :

« V'là les Yankees, v'là les Yankees, Easy come, Wisigoths, V'là les Gringos ! ».

Choquant, Richard Desjardins sait l'être. Il l'a d'ailleurs fort bien prouvé dans un poème intitulé *Mer intérieure*, publié par le

Devoir en mai dernier. Grand défenseur de la cause autochtone, Desjardins décrivait l'arrivée des Français en Amérique dans une optique un peu différente de celle à laquelle nous sommes habitués. Le vers « Chien de Français ! », maintes fois répété, avait soulevé l'indignation d'un bon nombre de Québécois. Mais monsieur Desjardins est assez grand pour savoir ce qu'il a à faire. Il se glorifie d'avoir pu chanter ce qu'il voulait tout au long de sa carrière, et non pas ce que pouvaient lui dicter les normes sociales.

Toute personne sensible à une poésie peu conventionnelle et pouvant

apprécier une voix usée par les années, qui n'est pas sans rappeler celle de Tom Waits, est susceptible de succomber à l'art de Desjardins. Avec *Akinisi*, une histoire d'amour d'un genre unique, il défie les lois établies de la chanson sentimentale. Pour un peu d'exotisme, il y a *The Ballad of the Millwheel*, un texte de Bertolt Brecht interprété en anglais avec un accent bien québécois. Et pour raconter sa naissance le 16 mars 1948, quoi de mieux qu'une musique de Maurice Ravel!

Une voix accompagnée d'un piano ou d'une guitare : la sobriété à savourer !

COMMENT BROUILLER VOS PERCEPTIONS

L'holographie en tant qu'art visuel est un phénomène assez nouveau et peu reconnu dans les cercles artistiques. Néanmoins, on peut voir l'holographie commerciale partout, autour de nous - signes du zodiaque, médailles, cadres de montres, auto-collants et boucles d'oreilles. La plupart des gens ignore qu'on peut voir de l'holographie grandeur nature et de très bonne qualité à l'Interference Hologram Gallery, 1179A King St. West, ici à Toronto. L'exposition présentée ces jours-ci, conçue et réalisée par le Centre d'Art Holographique et Photonique Inc., s'intitule "L'Autre Transparence: Oeuvres Holographiques, 5 artistes du Québec."

Parmi les cinq hologrammes exposés, il y en a un qui est plus frappant et plus intrigant que les autres. Brazza (1987), de Jean-François Catin, un hologramme de réflexion en lumière blanche (30 x 40 cm), représente un livre, debout et ouvert, avec un grand trou qui ressemble à une brûlure. Sur un côté de la couverture se trouve un rocher et sur l'autre, une corde, avec un seul noeud, suspendu dans l'air. L'aspect mystérieux de cette oeuvre se trouve dans l'illusion optique que est créée lorsqu'on regarde sous un certain angle le trou et sa relation spatiale avec la corde.

En regardant la corde, on est convaincu qu'elle continue de l'autre côté du trou, mais en se déplaçant vers la gauche, on constate immédiatement que la corde s'arrête avant même d'arriver au trou. Ce paradoxe est déroutant mais on est fasciné par la magie de Brazza. Comment interpréter l'art qui nous force à nous questionner sur les relations spatio-temporelles de notre environnement tri-dimensionnel? L'artiste lui-même offre une réponse éloquente: "L'image holographique nous regarde comme le miroir de nos fuyantes certitudes de la réalité."
