On Tuesday, March 23, Professor Michiel Horn held a lecture on the subject of academic freedom and in this lecture, Pro Tem professorial self-censorship in Canada.

The lecture's title (the same as this article's) was taken from an article appearing in a 1931 edition of the Varsity, a University of Toronto student paper. The 1931 article criticised professors for lacking moral courage. It stated that they chose to worry about jeopardising their jobs rather than say what they thought.

The lecture included a number of interesting historical anecdotes, encapsulating a period from the 1850's into the 1960's.

When asked how selfcensorship pressures limited professorial academic freedom at Glendon, Professor Horn said that the pressures weren't too great, but that he sometimes had to "pull punches," so as not to offend.


Professor Horn, chair of the history department, has written a number of books, articles and book reviews. His present work on the subject of academic freedom began in 1985.





PREVIENING GLENDON

On March 16 and 17, Glendon's Department of Advising and Liaison held their annual March Break Campus Visits. This year's campaign was a great success bringing 101 potential students (together with parents and friends to total 200) to Glendon over the course of the week. These numbers represent an increase of 35 per cent over last year, an increase which Glendon's Liaison Coordinator Julie Pärna Stief attributes to the general publicity about tightened admissions to all universities in Toronto.

March 16 and 17 participated in general information session in the Senate Chambers, and an hour long tour of the Campus given by Glendon Student Ambassadors. An informal reception in the Senate Chambers which gave visitors an opportunity to ask questions and meet with the principal, the dean and various members of faculty concluded the official part of the orientation. Those who chose

Visitors to Glendon on to stay on and explore the campus themselvestook advantage of the free cafeteria beverage offered by the business office, or visited one of a member of classes designated as "open classes" for the day.

Participants in these sessions came as far afield as Thunder Bay, Deep River and New Lisegard, and other visitors during the week included an exchange from New Zealand and a mother and daugh-

ter from Nova Scotia.

These March Break Campus Visits are part of ongoing programme at Advising and Liaison, whose goal, as described by Mrs. Pärna Stief, is, "to get as many students to come on campus as possible". For this year, the Glendon derpartment, unlike York Main, offers tours on Saturdays and on demand.

Other special initiatives this year included a Fall Campus Day which brought 55 potential students (plus parents and friends for a total of 120) to Glendon in November 1992. A similar Spring Campus Day is being organized for May 15.

Overall, 120 individual students visited Glendon between September and December, 1992. This represents a 50 ner cent increase


THE WILL OF THE WOODS'

To allow students the opportunity to meet one of the candidates, an information session was held on Thursday March 18 at 7:00 PM in Hilliard Pit with Conservative Dave Johnson.

Mr. Johnson, who is currently mayor of East York, was accompanied by Don Valley West Member of Parliament, John Bosley, and councilors from East York municipal government. The students at the meeting were able to ask questions of Mr. provincial deficit, funding support to post-secondary students through the Ontario

In times of economic struggle and political change, it is not surprising that some students feel powerless. But, your vote can make a difference. For all eligible voters living on campus, remember to vote on April 1. It is your democratic right.

WHAT'S IN A RESUME?

The colour of your eyes? The exotic place where you were born? Your political belifs? The number of toddlers you have at home? None of the above, because of course these are illegal questions wich prospective employers can no longer ask from applicants. The laws surrounding employment have made great strides in recent times and current résumés should reflect this progress. So how do you market yourself in this period of fierce competition for the relatively few jobs available?

2-page résumé in point form. This is not an English lit essay, so stay away from those lengthy explanation in fancy language: the employer has no time to plough through all the verbiage. Make it easy for him/her to find the information he wants. Use a computer with a good quality printer (the student computer centre in Room A113 is available to you) and make sure there are no (I mean absolutely NO!) mistakes. A typewriter is now available at the Counselling Centre for writting résumés and filling out applications. Statistics show that an employer spends an average of 20 seconds per résumé and if you don't impress him in that period of time, he won't read the rest. This takes him halfway down the first page, so you better put your most marketable skills in that space. For students that usually means education, but there are ways of highlighting other assets right up at the top.

The current trend is for ling and Career Centre offers two types of résumé service: group sessions for those who have not yet started, in order to provide basic startup information, and individual r'sumé reviews by appointment with our qualified résumé counsellors (in both official languages). The number of submissions to the contest has increased over last year, and the judges found the overall quality of submissions highly professional.

So how do you market yourself? Make a detailed plan of action, keep at it for as much time as you can manage, and use the service offered by the Counselling and Career Centre to help you create an impressive professional résumé. France Gauthier et Christian Thomas font un travail respectable, mais Suzanne Bennett, qui n'en est pourtant pas à ses premières armes avec Brel pour avoir


laissent pas intimider par quelques menus obus. Pourtant, à la fin, ils meurent tous, au grand plaisir des « ramasseurs » de corps.






