



Glendon's Carmen of the Main

"Y'know that old word from Sesame Street - cooperation? It definitely applies." This is how Tanya Yanaky, who played the title role in Theatre Glendon's recent production of *Sainte Carmen of the Main*, sums up the mood that permeated cast and crew throughout the process leading up to and during the show.

This "play about the people" (Tanya Yanaky), written by Michel Tremblay and translated by John Van Burek explores the effect of a popular club singer's triumphant return from Nashville on the people of the "Main" (Montreal's rue Ste. Catherine). Carmen, who had in the past offered tired Country and Western platitudes to her audience,

surprises and delights by introducing an entirely new repertoire based on the experiences of the "down and out". Her inspirational songs are instant hits with the derelicts, druggies and prostitutes who frequent the club and she is consequently transformed into a kind of folk hero. Unfortunately, the powers-that-be, in the form of club-owner Maurice and

his sleazy hired-gut Toothpick, are not about to allow their profitable stake in the deterioration of the Main go up in smoke. They counteract Carmen's Pollyannaish idealism by murdering her in the dressing room and putting the blame on her dresser Harelip. Finally, however, Carmen's spirit survives, and she becomes a sort of modern-day messiah to the people.

Considering the amount of time the class of English 2530 had to put this



Les élections de l'AECG: sérieuse ou non ?

Deux étudiants se méritent une bourse

Les étudiants de l'Université York ont remporté deux des quatre bourses offertes aux étudiants ontariens cette année.

Patrick Scotto di Luzio de North York et Manon Harvey de Sainte-Anne de la Pérade (Québec) sont deux des récipiendaires des bourses reconnues Fessenden-Trott distribuées par l'Association des universités et collèges du Canada. Les deux autres récipiendaires venaient de l'Université McMaster à Hamilton et de l'Université Carleton à Ottawa.

S'ils arrivent à maintenir une moyenne académique, les gagnants receveront chacun 9 000\$ par année jusqu'à ce qu'ils obtiennent leur baccalauréat.

Manon Harvey est une étudiante de 21 ans qui se spécialise dans les études des femmes au Collège universitaire Glendon. Cette année elle participe à un programme d'échange entre

le Collège universitaire Glendon et l'Université libre de Bruxelles afin de poursuivre ses études en Belgique. Rejointe à Bruxelles, elle explique : « J'avais toujours rêver d'étudier en Europe, sauf que ça coûtait trop cher. Grâce à cette échange d'une durée d'un an, je réalise un vieux rêve. »

La bourse a été établie en 1979 au nom du canadien Reginald Aubrey Fessenden et de sa femme Helen May Fessenden (née Trott) aujourd'hui décédés. Reginald Fessenden a été un des pionniers en radiodiffusion. Il enseignait aussi l'électrotechnique dans diverses universités canadiennes et américaines. student member from the Board of Governors (the most powerful board of York University.) You'll just have to take my word because I was the sole spectator.




Editorial right to reply

The Lessons of 9 Years of Conservative Rule

The record of Tory lies, deceit and duplicity are now a sickening reality to nearly everyone. From the "sacred" trusts and the tax on books and magazines to the orgy of patronage and the secret sell-out of Pearson Airport; it is all evidence, again, of a party which thinks it is above public accountability, of a party which thinks it has a god-given right to rule, of a party which is convinced that 9/10ths of the citizenry are sheep, of a party which has nothing but the most cynical contempt for most Canadians.

For me personally, this does not come as a surprise as I have long been aware, of what the conservative philosophy means. In essence, it is and always has been an amoral philosophy based on the twin axiom of "non-intervention" and "everyone for himself"; and it manifests itself in the dogmatic belief that privatization is both the means and the end to accumulating wealth. The flaw in this philosophy lies in the fact that such accumulation of wealth is achieved only by a few individuals and at the expense of everyone else. But back to Mulroney and conservatism.

How did we allow Brian and his bunch, in just nine years, to wreak havoc in our cherished institutions, to imperil our distinctiveness as Canadians? How did the Tories get away with it for so long? And what is a Tory?

These are now vital

questions and the answer must be the final lessons towards the path of our political maturity. We all must, at last, rid ourselves of the typical Canadian naiveté which the Conservatives knew was a Canadian trait. They also knew that they could first promise everything and then renege on everything once they were elected. Let us face the facts: It all started in 1984, in New York, when Brian declared "Canada is now open for business." His statement had two meanings. He was, firstly, passing the hat for alms and, secondly, telling an American audience made up of Republican businessmen steeped in Reaganomics that we, the Tories in Canada, are just like you, for we believe, again just like you, in three things: lining our pockets, privatization and the public welfare be damned! Ring leader Brian went on to tell them that Canada had

everything they needed, that everything was up for sale and that if present legislation prevented selling what the Americans wanted, not to worry, he would amend the law to allow the sale.

These declarations and assurances were a harbinger of events to come, for they came out of the mouth of a member of a generation who was born and bred in the tradition of subserviency to American interests: a tradition which started in the '60s when young Brian and his fellow puppets found employment in American-owned subsidiaries.

And so the process of destruction began. The Conservatives, being true to themselves and in accordance with their hidden agenda, sold everything in sight, raised taxes by 23 billions in the first two years alone, rewarded themselves by

feeding at the trough, dismantled our social safety nets, imposed the G.S.T. and free trade, thus bringing a slow death to our agricultural and industrial base and striking a mortal blow to our cultural identity; all the while knuckling under to American demands.

Why did the Tories get away with it for so long?

Because most Canadians are apathetic and are kept uninformed, because they don't vote according to the issues, because they give in to the back of a wordless politician seen on a T.V. ad walking in the woods under a caption spelling "leadership," because the voice of the press is feeble and too polite, because Canada does not have a political checks and balances system and because Tory belief is a fanatical one.

But what is a Tory and when does the philosophy become firmly rooted?

It all must be cemented before the age of 25, before life teaches the virtues of compassion and humanity. For many, Toryism becomes entrenched during the years of college or university studies. Its most fertile grounds are the faculties of economics, law, commerce and business administration.

All of these glorify such motivators as personal assets, theories of yield, greed and bottom line policies. It is there that the formula is neatly packaged and delivered. There is hardly any mention of honour, public service or integrity, instead, it is profit first; conscience and ethics, if there are any, are left way behind. It is also there that

the North American myth of becoming a millionaire and retiring at forty is perpetuated. Of course, both the formula and myth have a purpose. The purpose is the spreading of an ideology. As a graduate in economics and in business administration, I have long realized that universities in North America are engaged in the selling of an ideology, of which the basic tenet are "me, me, grab, grab." Remember Ronald Reagan who, 3 weeks after the end of his presidency of the richest country in the world, went to Japan to collect this \$1 million only after the Japanese agreed to double their original offer. While many reject this greedy and mercenary cult of the "me, me first," there are others who, on the contrary, embrace it heart and soul and become infected for life. In the process they become, like Mulroney and his accom-

plices, Tory candidates or supporters. Such was the scenario in 1984 and 1988. The parts were written long in advance, the actors knew their lines and it all went according to the script. The Conservatives nearly destroyed Canada and we let them do it.

Clarifions un point dès maintenant. C'est en tant que simples étudiants que nous aimerais émettre ces quelques commentaires. Nous exprimons ainsi un point de vue personnel (possiblement celui de beaucoup d'étudiants(es)) de même que notre désappointement envers l'équipe éditoriale de Pro Tem. Grants have been cut by the provincial government, tuition fees are going up, and to top it all off, completing any administrative task has become increasingly difficult. We do however, tolerate varying moods of the administrative faculty at Glendon, and ridiculously overpriced services, like the bookstore.

Tea Party's soldout Wednesday night concert, a live recording for CBC's Ear to the Ground series, sent the appreciative crowd lining the walls of Lee's Palace into a state of delirium. Aside from minor technical problems early in the show, which unfortunately sacrificed two-thirds of their unofficial anthem: The River, the performance was both solid and innovative, providing ample justification for *Splendor Solis'* gold status.

For those readers who have not yet discovered the Tea Party's psychedelic blues thrash sound, it can essentially be summarized as early Cult meets Led Zeppelin with a young Jim Morrison on vocals. Actually, it is Jeff Burrows' vocal range, which easily rivals that of Morrison, that gives The Tea Party their distinct sound and strength. Echoes of the Kashmir album are provided by Jeff Martin, a sober Jimmy Page who plays both bass and sitar (the Indian lute). Tea Party's raw performance energy is reminiscent of early Cult, but it serves only as a foundation from which

Burrows soars.

The Duke serves a veritable plethora of ales, lagers and stouts on tap of which any staff member can easily rattle off all sixteen on command. The domestic beers on tap include: Toby, Fosters Lager, Carlsberg Lager, Carlsberg Light and Export Ale. The prices are easy to swallow at \$3.80/pint & \$2.50/half-pint. A fine selection of micro-brewery beers are also available on tap including: Wellington County Ale, Arkell Best Bitter, Creemore

Springs, Upper Canada Light Lager and Upper Canada Dark Ale. The prices remain minimal at \$4.10/pt & \$3.05 half-pt. Double Diamond, Harp Lager, Smithwicks, Guinness, John Smith's Bitter, Fuller's ESB and Younger's Tartan Special are among the imported draught offered at \$4.65/pt & \$3.05/ half-pt. Bottled beer goes for \$3.55 for domestic and \$3.75 for

premium, while mixed drinks are available for \$4.40.

The Duke of Kent, which has been around now for 15 years, is located at 2315 Yonge St. (1 blk. N. of Eglinton at Roehampton) and

is owned by the Imago Corporation. This corporation concerns itself with quality because it has a certain reputation to protect. In addition to The Duke of Kent, Imago also owns The Duke of York (39 Prince Arthur), The Duke of Westminster (First Canadian Place), a number of other bars and restaurants and yes, the well-known RPM.

The Duke's menu includes the traditional British pub fare such as Steak & Kidney Pie and Bangers 'n' Mash as well as a good variety of other dishes. The prices are fairly modest and the daily specials are great values. The Duke offers brunch both Saturdays and Sundays from 11am to 4pm. This is especially considerate of late-risers like myself.

The Duke of Kent is a comfortable and friendly place to socialize, watch a game or simply drink yourself into a dither. Definitely a credit to its genre of alehouse!

L'AFFAIRE TARTUFFE : UNE PIÈCE POLITIQUE FOR APOLITICAL TIMES

The *Globe and Mail* called it "A Political Parable". Le *Devoir* l'a décrite comme « Une tentative de réunir les deux solitudes ». Marianne Ackerman, its creator, says "it's about yearning to be free of a political agenda. It's the perfect play for apolitical times." Elle dit aussi que « Être anglophone ou francophone compte moins que les idées qu'on partage. »

Based loosely on the attempts of British garrison officers at staging a play by Molière in the year 1774 in Montreal, *L'Affaire Tartuffe* simultaneously deconstructs and reinforces the idea of a "language barrier". The play opens in the year 1992, with two up-and-coming filmmakers making a pitch to la ministre québécoise des Affaires culturelles, the vice-president of Molson's (who seems a little bit too fond of his work) and a well-respected francophone actress at a posh dinner party in Old

Montreal. Soudainement, le repas est interrompu par une panne d'électricité et les invités sont transportés au 18^e siècle. Le vice-président est transformé magiquement en propriétaire irlandais d'une taverne; un des cinéastes est transformé en jeune corporal britannique, l'autre en jeune metteur en scène français. En plus, un homme d'affaires est métamorphosé en coureur des bois : un «Canayen» à l'accent prononcé. Les femmes sont transformées elles aussi : une en française pure-laine qui éprouve des

dificultés dans son mariage avec un écossais, l'autre en irlandaise qui refuse de parler en anglais (elle parle que gaélique), et une française de Paris qui tombe amoureuse du corporal britannique.

The alliances which emerge as this motley crew attempt to put together a play banned by the Catholic Church (for its "dangerous" ideas regarding religious faith), with actors who don't speak the language, are surprising and often funny. The British corporal constantly romanticizes the "second language experience", saying it is like "finding another part of your soul", whereas the dour and disenchanted Scotsman insists "you can dress an idiot up in new clothes and he's still an idiot." Nevertheless, whether

it be out of love or necessity, each character struggles to learn the language of his or her enemy, with interesting results. The Irish tavern-owner, intent upon finally freeing himself of the yoke of English rule, enlists the help of Jean-Pierre (le "Canayen") in plotting a rebellion. Colonel Harry Humphreys, played by Robert Vézina, insists on playing the role of the hypocrite Tartuffe, then later forbids the performance of the play, saying it will offend certain members of the clergy. Ironically, the talented Vézina also plays the all-powerful M^r Montgolfier, who insists French Canadians are not yet ready for Tartuffe.

L'essentiel de l'action, autant contemporaine qu'historique, se déroule autour d'une grande table rectan-

gulaire. Pour Ackerman, cette table représente la communion et la communication, pas de la rhétorique politique rebattue. Pour l'auditoire, cette table représente aussi un endroit où la passion et la raison, l'histoire et l'imagination s'entremêlent, ce qui crée du théâtre non seulement bilingue et biculturel, mais aussi passionnant.

Malheureusement, la pièce était présentée dans le cadre du Festival Upfront, et jouait seulement au Young People's Theatre jusqu'au 23 octobre. Désormais, *L'Affaire Tartuffe* sera présentée à Montréal du 10 au 13 novembre, et à Sherbrooke le 19 et le 20 novembre. It would be worth the drive to go see it!

MOVIE REVIEW: MR. WONDERFUL

Mr. Wonderful, directed by Anthony Minghella (*Truly, Madly, Deeply*), is a predictably sweet and sporadically moving romance which warrants the price of admission on cheap Tuesday, due largely to its notable cast. If you are enjoying the bliss that accompanies the first thirty days of a new relationship, this one's for you. The same applies for all you closet love-weenies.

The film stars a believable Matt Dillon (*Singles*) as Gus, an Italian electrical worker, whose wife Lee, played by Annabella Sciorra (*Jungle Fever*), has left him in pursuit of higher education and a hipper, more enlightened existence. Lee's departure symbolizes her desire to escape what she initially perceives as confining working-class roots of which Gus is a manifestation. Ironically, it is also Gus, rejected, confused, and understandably bitter, who is financing his ex-wife's solo adventure in bohemia via his alimony payments.

Although he is still quite in love with her, Gus becomes progressively more resentful in regard to subsidizing Lee's new life. When his financial obligation to her jeopardizes an important business opportunity, Gus decides to take action. He embarks on a campaign to find Lee a new husband, thus abdicating himself from the responsibility of supporting her and indirectly helping himself move on. Everyone gets involved in this challenge, including Gus' frustrated transitional girlfriend, played knowingly by Mary-Louise Parker.

Following a series of

comically unsuccessful blind dates, Gus finally sets Lee up with a legitimate and charming prospect. She manages to juggle this new possibility and her continued affair with a married professor, portrayed effortlessly by William Hurt. When the charming prospect evolves into a marriage proposal, Gus realizes his feelings for Lee remain unchanged. Not-so-surprisingly, Lee's feelings are not far removed. *Mr. Wonderful* receives a C+, as a charitable assessment



COMMUNIQUE

Street Proofing Glendon

Have you ever been walking in the Lower Lot at Glendon and heard footsteps behind you or a loud noise in the woods? What did you do: turn, look, then walk more quickly? What would you do if the footsteps followed you or if someone tried to attack you?

These questions were addressed on October 7th by Terry Wright and Al Mossman, Crime Prevention Officers of York Security. They met with 15 residence students in Hilliard for two hours and offered practical solutions to this fright: a middle ground between doing nothing and being overly physical.

Protection, such as whistles or hand-held alarms, are great as long as they are within easy reach: a whistle in your purse will not be effective if you have been pinned down, neither will a hand held alarm if your batteries are dead! The best protection is not travelling

alone at night and staying in well lit areas.

Self-defense begins with trusting your "gut" instincts; we are socialized to give people the benefit of the doubt and let them intrude on our personal space: the attacker acts upon this. If you do not trust a person, have a "funny" feeling, or are uncomfortable in any way, move away. Set a physical boundary between the attacker and yourself. You must train yourself to look and act strongly, especially when you don't feel it.

If you feel you have to use force, and York Security stresses that this is a personal decision, then "give it all

you've got"-use all the opportunities presented to you. It is in this way that you will make it far more difficult for the attack to continue.

Mssrs. Wright and Mossman highlighted the point that it is important to visualize potential attacks. This is not to make you more paranoid, but rather to make you feel more in control and confident if something does happen...being able to walk in the Lower Lot without panicking or being able to wait at a bus stop without being harassed.

BACKPAGE**LE MONDE DE KIM CAMPBELL :
LE PARADIS TERRESTRE**

This article refers to Alex E. Limion's Editorial entitled "Women with power". Not only is the title grossly misleading, but the editor obviously does not know why he is voting for a woman candidate or what Kim Campbell even stands for!! I will therefore attempt to enlighten the PC hungry editor, Mr. Limion.

Le 24 mai 1918, les Canadiennes - grâce aux suffragettes - obtiennent le droit de vote au terme d'une grande lutte sans pareil. Quant aux gouvernements provinciaux du Manitoba, de la Saskatchewan et de l'Alberta, ils accordent le droit de vote aux femmes en 1916. L'Ontario et la Colombie-Britannique suivent en 1917. Dès 1918, la Nouvelle-Écosse cède, le Nouveau-Brunswick en 1919, l'Île-du-Prince-Édouard en 1922 et Terre-Neuve en 1925. Les Québécoises devront attendre 1940!

Comment expliquer ce grand débat? Pourquoi les femmes ont-elles dû travailler si longtemps pour revendiquer leurs droits? Pourquoi doivent-elles continuer à lutter pour l'obtention de droits fondamentaux quand nous vivons dans une société dite libre, ouverte et démocratique? A

vrai dire, il va falloir que les femmes du Canada luttent énormément parce que la société canadienne n'est pas aussi démocratique qu'elle devrait l'être. Actuellement, 14% des députés au Parlement sont des femmes.

Il est important de comprendre que la société ne leur a pas offert ces droits. Au Canada, où nous avons une « démocratie », ce sont les femmes qui ont arraché le droit de vote, se sont battues pour devenir candidates aux élections et se faire élire. Elles n'occupent pourtant qu'une infime partie des postes élus aux

gouvernements. A vrai dire, elles sont carrément exclues des centres de pouvoir où se décident des questions qui influencent la qualité de vie et l'avenir de tous les citoyens et citoyennes. Depuis l'élection d'Agnes MacPhail (la première femme à la Chambre des Communes en

1921), il n'y a eu que 65 femmes qui y ont siégé. La représentation fédérale et provinciale en proportions égales risque alors de s'accroître tellement qu'il s'écoulerait des décennies. Malgré ces données, la progression récente des femmes en politique est phénoménale.

In fact, Canada (can I presume it is a "notable" country like Iceland, Sweden or England) had recently been blessed with a woman prime minister. How "exciting"! After all, the Right Honourable Kim Campbell, as a woman will surely shake the foundation of patriarchy. Canada can finally boast of a prime minister who will discuss and support women's issues, a woman who will give child care priority over the multi-billion dollar funding of military helicopters!!

Of course, a vote for Kim is a vote for launching national child care and employment equity programmes. A vote for Kim is also a vote for removing child support taxes, for including statistics of women's unpaid labour in the home and volunteer work, and for ending male violence

against women. Naturally, a vote for Kim is a vote for restoring full funding to women's groups, for legalizing abortion, and for funding breast cancer research. Moreover, a vote for Kim is a vote for research and treatment of women with HIV/AIDS, and for same sex spousal benefits for lesbian and gay couples. It is no wonder, then, why all eligible voters will support such a woman who stands for equal empowerment, for fairness and for feminism! How could Canadians possibly reject a female prime minister and miss the opportunity of a lifetime to see those patriarchal walls crumble?


